WORK SUSPENDED.

No More Work at Mayflower Mines Until Spring.

Dan Stalter and Wm. Lawson have returned from the Mayflower mines.

By hard work the new machinery, consisting of a complete stamp mill and sawmill was taken into the mines before the first heavy snow fall. The machinery is now all on the ground.

The heavy snows which came not long ago forced Mr. Stalter and his crew to cease operations for the winter, as not much could be accomplished in placing the machinery during the storms of winter as a great deal of labor would be outside work.

As soon as spring opens Mr. Stalter will take a force of men and the mills will be put to work as soon as possible.

The prospects for the next year's work at the Mayflower mines now seem very flattering.

Several of the mines are no longer prospects. There has been enough development work to prove the existence of a large body of ore that will pay to work. In some of the ores, values run high.

Every miner who has visited the mines has been very much impressed with what was in sight.
