Morning, afternoon and evening sessions were held and at each meeting Association Hall was packed to the doors.

The climax of the convention came at the evening session, when the commitbee on tax revision, appointed at the McMinnville convention of November 31, made its report. This committee stated that it had compiled all the tax laws and regulations for 40 years back and from the mass had evolved a new law to be given to the people at the June election for their sanction. It was contended by the committee that a somplete revision of the Oregon tax law was necessary before all property would Bear its equal and just burden, and all the people of the state would share equally in the expenses of the state government.
