Of all the fool things for many a day, the movement started at Baker City to start a subscription for a dowry fund to be given to Miss Alice Roosevelt, is the biggest of all. Of course such a gift would be refused. The president's family should not be classed with paupers. Now that the thing is started, send the Baker City idiots to the asylum and stop the foolishness.

HENEY AND LAND FRAUDS.

To Mr. Heney, Puter, McKinley and Miss Watson owe their liberty, and the many people who have been so outrageously robbed through the forgeries of these rascals must thank Mr. Heney for their losses. The cases against these defendants were about ready for trial when Heney was sent to Oregon to make for himself a good reputation. Had the trial been

left to the regularly appointed officials there would have been a conviction. This would have been followed by imprisonment, and today the department of justice and the state of Oregon would know where to look for these scoundrels, and the people who have been robbed by them of about a quarter of a million dollars would not be looking for them.

But Hitchcock had a grudge against the Oregon delegation, and especially Congressman Hermann. Therefore a man who could "do the business" was sent from California to astonish the world, destroy the influence of Oregon's delegation and satisfy his own great vanity. The case against these defendants was tried. Any lawyer of ordinary ability could have secured their conviction, and they were convicted. But this was not the business Heney came to do; he must destroy the influence of Oregon in Congress. It was no sooner demonstrated that Puter and McKinley were reckless criminals of the worst character than Heney entered into an alliance with them to do the business he was sent to Oregon to do; they were at once offered immunity if they would assist in besmirching others whom Hitchcock desired to destroy. A most unreasonable story was made up by them, which suited Heney's purpose and they gave their fiction to Heney. Without awaiting for the disposition of their motion for a new trial Heney, without any order of court (as is now reported) turned the defendants loose without bonds, to continue their life of crime.

Granting immunity to such criminals may not be bribery, but generally it is called that. It may be necessary in the process of destroying the reputations of men who stand as well, to say the least, before their fellow men as Heney ever did; but it is absolutely foreign to the honest administra-

tion of our laws and to the sense of justice and fairness of every American citizen.

Mr. Heney is now reported as being concerned because of the escape of these, his friends, the worst rascals the state has ever harbored. Not because they will escape the well-deserved and long-delayed punishment which should await them, nor because, by reason of his disregard of the true purposes of the administration of justice, these convicted criminals have been permitted to rob the people of Wisconsin and Illinois, but because their escape will prevent his using them in his business, namely, besmirching the men who were indicted upon their testimony. If Heney does not land these, his allies, in the penitentiary, his work in Oregon is worse than a failure, it is a disgraceful farce.

It is now said that these criminals can never be sentenced upon the verdict already returned, their motion for a new trial not having been disposed of and the judge who presided at the trial having since died. To a layman this looks like the blunder of a third rate lawyer. Had Heney not been standing by the men whom he should have landed in prison (and who would undoubtedly have been sent there but for him) he would have been as prompt in urging a disposition of a motion for a new trial as he was in certain other cases.—The Dallas Chronicle.
