W. F. Matlock returned Saturday evening from a trip to Kansas City and Chicago. Mr. Matlock visited the big stock show at Chicago and saw the champion steer sell for 25 cents per pound live weight. Mr. Matlock not only went to visit the stock show, but also to look into the big market centers for the purpose, if possible, of getting a better market for the cattle grown here. He has been absent about three weeks.

The fine meat display of Rasmus & Boyer, at the Liberty Meat Market, on Christmas, was very attractive and reflects credit upon the enterprise of this up-to-date firm. Besides a great variety of fine meats ornamented with decorations, hanging in the middle of the building was a mammoth hog that weighed 480 pounds dressed. The greatest attraction was a dressed Shorthorn cow from W. O. Minor's herd. The cow Una, was one of Mr. Minor's prized show cows and when ready for the show ring tipped the scales at 2150 pounds. When killed, the cow weighed 1850 pounds. Mr. Minor stated to a Gazette representative that he bought this cow when a calf from J. G. Robinson, in Indiana, paying \$500 for her. Since that time he sold three calves from her for \$1800 and has a fine show heifer left. Now that she has outlived her usefulness, instead of proudly wearing the blue ribbons, the butcher's block is her fate, and the beef is certainly prime and would bring a fancy price in any city.

DAM IS COMPLETED.

Private Irrigation Scheme on John Day.

The dam across the John Day river is at last completed. Work was begun on the dam on August 28th.

The main dam is 14 feet high and 150 feet wide, with a cribwork on the south side of the river about 100 feet in length. The huge log cribs are filled with brush and rocks and surfaced with planks. The original plan was to build the dam 12 feet high, but it was afterwards decided to make it 14 feet so as to be sure to have sufficient fall for the ditches.

Two large ditches will be taken out above the dam, one on each side of the river. The ditch on the south bank will supply water for W. B. Potter's ranch, while the one on the north side will irrigate the bottom land on the ranches of J. B. N. lan, C. N. Wagner, Albert Foster and Chas. Royce. The ditches will be completed during the winter and it is the intention of those interested to use the water next season. —Spray Courier.

PLAN CHANGED.

Palace Hotel Will be Run on Restaurant Style.

The kitchen of the Palace hotel is now in charge of M. B. Haines whose ability as a cook is well known in Morrow county and needs no comment here.
