SHEARING IS BEGUN.

Samples of Clip From Mutton Sheep
Reach Market.Shearing of mutton sheep is now
under way and the first samples of the
clip reached Portland Thursday, says
the Oregonian. There are 35,000 fleeces
to be sheared at Pendleton, 6,000 at Tue-
dale and 6,000 at Seattle, the total clip
from which will amount to about 282,000
pounds.No contracting of the 1906 wool clip
is being done in the state, so far as can
be learned. The growers are so con-
fident of the future that they are willing
to take their chances in the open mar-
ket, or at least wait until the season be-
fore they sell the wool on the sheep's
back. Last year a large proportion of
the clip was sold ahead at what were
very good prices, but the values to which
the market later climbed put so much
money into the pockets of dealers that
the sheep raisers are determined to get
the profit themselves this year, and
consequently ignore the offers of buyers
to make contracts.A few contracts were written in Eastern
Oregon last fall, but it is estimated
that less than 500,000 pounds were sold.
In Idaho the growers have shown more
willingness to let go and about half the
coming clip has already been contracted
the prices in the southern part of the
state ranging from 18 to 20 cents. Utah
growers have sold 60 per cent of their
clip ahead and from 30 to 40 per cent
has been taken in Wyoming, but in
Montana, as in this state, prices have
so steadily maintained on a high basis
that little or nothing has been done in
the way of future business.The world's markets have a very firm
tone, as is shown by the way that
values have been sustained in the Lon-
don sales this week, there being ad-
vances in some lines where the trade
confidently looked for declines. Sum-
ming up the general situation, a trade
publication of late date says: "The
market is strong on all grades, but es-
pecially so on quarter blood wools. All
conditions indicate a protraction of
present values. The strong foreign de-
mand in the European, Australian, New
Zealand and South American markets,
as compared with the weakness of last
year, shows that the probability of
cheaper wool is extremely remote."Mail advices from Boston say of Ore-
gon and California wools in that mar-
ket:A small amount of No. 1 and No. 2
grades of Oregon wool is to be had at
current quotation. The wools now here
are of poorer quality. Little demand
has been lately made.Quite a satisfactory business has
been put through in both northern and
middle counties of California as well as
in the Fall clip. Southern county wool
is about gone. Northern wools have
been active at 70c., while middle county
only brought 67 to 68c. Moderate sales
of the fall wools have been made at 60
to 62c for fine and 40 to 42c for defective.
Some Humboldt and Mendocino wools
have been sold at 28 to 29 1/2c.

SHOULD NOT BE NEGLECTED.

Fruit Inspector Harry Cummings
Gives Some Good Advice.Heppner, Oregon, Jan. 18, 1906.—
Through the courtesy of the county
papers, I wish to state to the fruit
growers throughout Morrow county,
that having been appointed fruit in-
spector for Morrow county, I call your
attention to the wormy, unclean con-
dition of our fruit. If you faithfully
follow the instructions I here give you,
you will speedily exterminate the codlin
moth, which is causing most of our
trouble. A clean healthy orchard that
will produce good, wholesome fruit is
a source of great profit and no one thing
will do as much to promote good health
as a plentiful supply of clean, healthy
fruit. At the present rate our orchards
will soon become worthless and a nuisance,
due entirely to a lack of attention,
for no place can they grow finer fruit
than will grow in Morrow county. Be-
careful to use the ingredients in the
exact proportion I give you; they are
very strong and must be used exactly
as set forth. Forewarned is forearmed,
so I will state that the wormy, decayed
stuff we have had to eat in the past
will be destroyed hereafter.

A Sure Spray For Codlin Moth.

In 2 gallons water dissolve 1 lb. white
arsenic and 2 lbs. sal soda; boil 15 min-
utes and you have 2 gal'lons of Arsenite
of Soda, put 25 gallons water in a barrel,
stir in 3 pints of above mixture. In a

second barrel put 25 gallons water and
stir in thoroughly 6 lbs. fresh slacked
lime, unite contents of both barrels,
strain through burlap, first spraying one
week after blossoms fall, repeat every
30 days. A heavy rain will wash off the
spray, making it necessary to spray
again.Don't omit the following: Take stone
lime, slack and prepare as for ordinary
white wash in box or barrel, fill a
bucket two-thirds full, now add one
pint gas tar and one pound whale oil
soap, dissolved in hot water, add enough
loam to make the bucket full, the right
thickness to apply with white wash
brush. Re:ove the earth from collar
of the tree, apply the wash from the
limbs to the roots, applied the first of
May it will destroy the Bark Louse and
drive out the borers. Moths will not
deposit eggs in or about the tree; ap-
plied same season, it also gives the tree
a bright, healthy appearance; applied
in the fall, it is a great protection
against rabbits. Sod should not be al-
lowed to grow in an orchard, the ground
should be lightly stirred every two
weeks until first of August, the earth
should be banked around each tree
every fall, a few shovels of earth will
add 20 per cent to the yield the follow-
ing year. An orchard will give greater
returns for the amount of care given it
than anything I know of. I shall call on
you in person as often as circumstances
will permit. I shall be on the alert at
all times to improve the fruit interests
of this county.

NEW LAND LAWS.

Congress Will Probably Make
Drastic Changes.Washington, Jan. 22.—There is every
reason to believe that important public
land legislation will be enacted during
the present session of Congress, but
the situation has not yet fully developed
and it is too early to predict what mod-
ification will be made in the existing
land laws. Any legislation that is en-
acted will follow, in a general way, the
recommendations of the Public Land
Commission, appointed two years ago
by the President to investigate and re-
port on the injurious and undesirable
features of the present laws and to
recommend such modifications as are
required in the interest of the bonafide
settler and the general public.Following is a synopsis of the reforms
that will probably be taken up by con-
gress:Repeal of timber and stone act.
Appraisal of timber and sale at auc-
tion under rules to be made by Sec-
retary of Interior.No land chiefly valuable for timber
to be patented under commutation
clause of homestead act.Desert land claimants to show that
they take land for own benefit and have
made no agreement to sell; claims to be
limited to 160 acres, actual residence of
at least two years, actual production of
valuable crops on one-fourth of area and
actual irrigation to be required.Commutation clause of homestead
law to be repealed or amended to be-
come effective only after three years'
actual residence.Agricultural land within boundaries
of forest reserve to be open to agri-
cultural entry.Grazing districts to be reserved by
Presidential proclamation; Secretary of
Interior to classify and appraise grazing
value, appoint officers in care of each
district, collect fee for grazing permits
and make regulations; regulations to
aim at largest permanent occupation by
actual settlers.
