NORTHERN

First Annual Meeting of New Rail-
road Company--Officers are
Elected.

The first annual meeting of the stock
holders of the Oregon Northern Railway,
the promoters of the proposed line from
Hardman down through the Eight Mile
and Gooseberry wheat belt and into Gil-
liam county with a terminal point at Bla-
lock, was held at the office of C. E.
Woodson, in this city, Tuesday after-
noon.

This company is composed principally
of farmers residing in the district through
which the proposed line will run. Ar-
ticles of incorporation have already been
filed with the Secretary of State.

The capital stock is placed at \$25,000,
and is a start to establish a permanent
survey end for the securing of right of
way and other necessary preliminary
work.

Of the \$25,000 capital stock, \$17,250.00
have already been subscribed. At Tues-
day's meeting nearly all of this stock
was represented in person and by proxy.

It was a representative meeting with
a large attendance, especially from
Eight Mile and Gooseberry.
W. J. Mariner, of Blalock, and others
interested in the proposition were pres-
ent.

The meeting was strictly of a business
nature. There were no speeches, every-
thing being confined to the transaction
of the necessary business that came be-
fore the meeting.

The temporary officers elected were:
C. E. Jones, chairman, and C. E. Wood-
son, Secretary.

The first order of business being the
roll call of stockholders, took some time.
Each stockholder's name was called and
the number of shares of stock stated
after each name.

There are 1,250 shares of stock with a
par value of \$20 per share. Among the
largest stockholders are Mr. and Mrs.
A. L. Ayers.

The notice of the call for the meeting
was read by the secretary, and by mo-
tion was placed on file as a part of the
records of the meeting.

The articles of incorporation as certi-
fied to by the Secretary of State were
read and by motion were also placed on
file as a part of the records.

Secretary Woodson read the by-laws
of the corporation. This proved to be a
lengthy document, covering the entire
scope of the desired object. The by-
laws were first read as a whole and later
were adopted by sections.

The only discussion of any note was
over the election of directors.
It was finally decided to place the
number of directors at five, taking geo-
graphical location as a basis for the se-
lection of the directors, in order that the
principal districts could be represented
by residents of these districts.

As in the transaction of all the busi-
ness, absolute harmony prevailed in the
selection and election of the five direct-
ors.

Only one name from each district was
submitted and the formality of ballot in
general was dispensed with. By motion,
in each election, the rules were suspend-
ed and the directors were elected by the
secretary casting the ballot.

The directors elected are as follows:
Hardman—John Adams.
Eight Mile—C. E. Jones.
Gooseberry and Ione—C. J. Anderson.
Olex—W. L. Tobv.
Blalock—W. J. Mariner.

The directors held a meeting Tuesday
evening and the following officers were
elected:

W. J. Mariner, president; C. E. Jones,
vice president; C. E. Woodson, secre-
tary; Geo. Conser, treasurer. C. E.
Jones was appointed as general superin-
tendent.

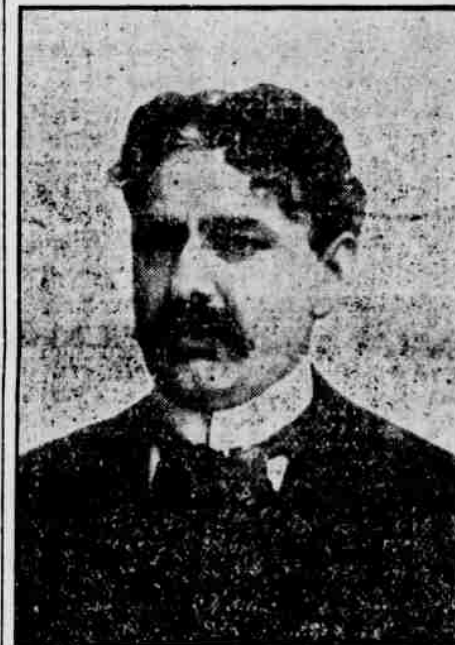

FRED W. MULKEY.

SENSATIONAL ARREST.

Prominent Federation Officials
Taken to Idaho.

DENVER, Colo., Feb. 18.—(Special.)
—With the arrest of the two heads of
the Western Federation of Miners comes
to light the story of a plot to do murder
in this state that makes the blood run
cold. Those in public office who had
taken a part in the overthrow of the
Western Federation were to have met
the fate of Idaho's ex-Governor, who
had used his office to arrest and punish
the murderers of the Coeur d' Alenes.

All the horrors of Cripple Creek, the
blowing up of the depot at Independ-
ence, the mine horrors, have come to
light through confessions said to have
been made recently by men arrested in
connection with the Steunenberg assas-
sination. Harry Orchard is one of the

culprits who has made confession of the
plots of the "inner circle" of the
Federation.

Orchard, who was arrested for the
murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, is
well known to the Cripple Creek author-
ities. When caught in Idaho, he was
immediately identified by the Cripple
Creek authorities. Later, Sheriff Bell
went to Lusho to bring him back on a
warrant issued immediately after the
Independence horror, which resulted in
the death of 14 nonunion miners, accus-
ing him of complicity in the plot and
charging murder. The Teller County
Sheriff returned without his man, as the
evidence against him for the assassi-
nation of Steunenberg was considered
sufficient to hold him and convict him
of murder.

Since that time Orchard has made a
confession of his whole part in the
bloody transactions. He has told of his
connection with the Cripple Creek
work, form the attempts made to dera
and throw a train over an embankment,
down to the Independence disaster,
which brought about a scattering of the
"inner circle" of the Dynamiters' Club,
many going to Idaho. From other
sources the Idaho assassination has been
brought home to prominent members of
the federation.

It is alleged that money was paid here
in Denver from the coffers of the orga-
nization to men like Orchard and his
gang for the work committed ranging up
in the thousands for explosions that
brought death. The Idaho officers say
that the evidence in their possession
from several different quarters makes it
certain that the coffers of the Western
Federation of Miners were used to aid
the dynamiters and the head officers
must have known what the money was
being paid for. Incriminating evidence
of another nature is also alleged.

What part, if any, Moyer and Hay-
ward had in the local attempts that
were frustrated to take revenge on the
men who had declared against the
Western Federation is problematical.
They will be tried in Idaho for their
alleged complicity in the assassination
of Idaho's ex-Governor.

It is charged that the Dynamiters'
Club had made all preparations for the
assassination of members of the State
Supreme Court of Colorado, who had
given opinions hostile to Haywood and
Moyer and the Western Federation.
Ex-Governor Peabody and Adjutant-
General Bell are said to have been on
the list for slaughter.

Dynamite bombs were placed in this
city to catch certain members of the
court and the ex-Governor and his Adju-
tant-General, and they were dug up not
very many days ago as a result of the
confessions that have been extorted
from the men under arrest in Idaho.

Two reasons are given for the failure
to explode the bombs. One is to the
effect that the men charged with the
duty failed at the last moment. The
other is that they were simply waiting
until the Idaho assassination had time
to sink from the public memory.

The mysterious assassination of
Martin B. Waller, a Cripple Creek
mining engineer, while on his way to his
home in this city one morning, has been
cleared. He was the victim of the
