Henry Blackman's Impressions on California Trip.

Hon. Henry Blackman who went to Los Angeles, California, with the Oregon Business Men's excursion, has returned to his home in this city.

To a Gazette representative, Mr. Blackman said:

"The excursion was one of great pleasure and will be remembered with satisfaction by all of the fortunate ones in the merry party.

"The spirit of returning in part, and the attempt to return the courtesy of California's great work and showing at the Lewis and Clark fair, is commendable and will help to combine our interests in common with the sister state.

"Our party consisted of 187 people, leaving Portland on the evening of January 13.

"Including the many stops, we were on the road for six days and occupied our berths for seven nights.

"We stopped at Sacramento, San Francisco, Palo Alto, San Jose, Del Monte, Pasosables, San Louis Obispo, Santa Barbara, arriving in Los Angeles having greatly enjoyed the above points of interest which will always entertain the tourist.

"At Los Angeles we were royally entertained with receptions, banquets and excursions, going to Long Beach, Venice, Ocean Park, Santa Monica, Pasadena, San Gabriel the great Baldwin livestock farm, and Cawstrin's ostrich farm.

"At Pasadena I saw J. W. Redington, the former editor of the Gazette.

"We were met and entertained by many of the prominent people of California. The responses from our party were ably attended to by Governor Chamberlain, Tom Richardson, Dr. Coe and J. H. Albert.

"There was rain and winter weather until we arrived at Santa Barbara, which is truly the land of perennial sunshine.

"I was greatly impressed with the every where apparent showing that the whole Pacific coast is entering an era of great prosperity and development. The larger cities are building mammoth buildings and the smaller towns are making rapid growth.

"California has had plenty of rain and is enjoying prosperity.

"Los Angeles is an active and enterprising city. She has a commercial club with a membership of 2600 and they work as a unit.

Since the Lewis and Clark fair, Oregon is well known. Californians speak well of our state. They believe that it is one of the coming states of the Union, and they are backing up their belief by the investment of capital with us.

"While there are many attractions for the tourist in California, with a climate where people can bathe in midwinter, I prefer Oregon. For diversified interests and summer climate there is no place like old Oregon."
