

BROWN IS OUT FOR GOVERNOR

Reform Sheriff Out on a Sweeping Reform Ticket.

(Extracts from Baker City Herald, Feb. 2, 1906.)

Harvey K. Brown, for the past four years sheriff of Baker county, announces himself a candidate for the nomination for governor on the republican ticket subject to the voters and not the machine of the party at the primaries on April 20, 1906.

His platform is as follows:
The primary law and the election of all officers by direct vote of the people.
Abolishment of all machines and bosses and let the people rule.

Enforcement of all laws, city, county, state and United States and the repealing of the same if not the proper laws for the people.

The abolishment of the use of money for campaign funds and purposes by any candidate, faction or corporation, only as actual legitimate expenses.

And last, but not least, woman suffrage.

Harvey Brown's Statement.

I believe in our new primary law because it gives the people a chance to select who they want; they are not compelled now to take what the old machine and bosses put up for them at the old convention.

I am a Roosevelt republican who in my opinion is one man that is strictly honest and one that money does not tempt and I think it time the republicans of Oregon were turning down the old machines and bosses and getting in line with the people because if they do not they will turn them all down as they have evidently done in Portland, and get men from another party who will do as the people want done.

The use of money for campaign purposes, I am strictly opposed to, only as actual legitimate expenses. Because people for the right don't put up money for that purpose but corporations, wholesale and retailers in illegitimate businesses and gamblers will put up money to no limit to hold onto and further their interests in the city, county, state and United States. And if they don't put up the money and a candidate does, generally, as past records will show, by grafting or using public money will go wrong, always to the detriment of the party and the people at large. And here I want to urge the republican party in every county to nominate the right kind of men for senators and representatives to be voted on at the next general election.

Now last of all but not least, woman suffrage. I believe in it because if a mother is capable of raising a boy from the cradle to manhood she is also capable of voting and helping to make laws help govern the boys after they are men. And if any one in the world has any influence over men for the betterment of mankind and good government it is a good mother, wife, daughter, sister or sweetheart, and we will all have to admit there is a very large majority of this kind in our glorious old Oregon, my native state.

Now as for my record it is here in Baker county, from childhood. And as to my record as sheriff I have done the best I could for the people under the circumstances and can say I am one man that is just as free today as I was the day I went in office and I will admit I am no orator or public speaker but one of the best single handed talkers in this county on these subjects and I expect some great criticism from our learned men of the state.

These few reasons for my platform are from my own personal experience and is the outcome of my going into office as sheriff of Baker county, determined to find out the reason why our laws were not enforced and why a majority of all officers go wrong.

lynsmen who had sworn to kill and destroy a man who had opposed the reign of the Federation. He had given offense to the organization.

The coup by which Moyer and Haywood were railroaded out of Denver was planned because the Idaho officers feared that Haywood and Moyer, if warned or permitted time, might see out a warrant of habeas corpus in the local courts.

Started out for Idaho.

DENVER, Feb. 18.—Charles H. Moyer and W. D. Haywood, president and secretary, respectively, of the Western Federation of Miners, and G. A. Pettibone, a member of the miners' executive board of that association, were arrested in this city last night on warrants charging them with complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, and were taken from their cells in the County Jail at an early hour this morning by an armed guard of 12 Deputy Sheriffs, escorted to the Union Depot and were there placed on board a special train that a few minutes later left the station, carrying the entire party, prisoners and armed deputies, over the Union Pacific Railroad on the way for Boise, Idaho.

The three men who were taken out of the city as prisoners of the Idaho authorities it was learned today, were arrested last night by three different officers, after extradition papers had been signed by Governor McDonald. The papers were delivered to the Governor McDonald had in his possession the papers issued in Idaho.

Governor McDonald signed the papers not later, it is believed, than 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon and a short time afterward left the city for Colorado Springs. The Governor is not expected to return before Monday or Tuesday. From information received tonight from officials at the County Jail, where Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone were put on their arrival by deputies, it is understood that these deputies were detailed from the office of Sheriff Nesbitt, of Denver, to make the arrests. The officers were instructed to preserve the greatest secrecy as to their mission. The three officials of the Federation were apprehended in different parts of the city, and were taken each by a different officer to the County Jail, where separate cells were provided.

President Moyer was about to leave the city for Deadwood, S. D., it is said, on a Burlington train, when he was accosted in the car by a Deputy Sheriff, who forthwith presented a warrant for Moyer's arrest. Secretary Haywood was taken in custody by an officer just as he had stepped out of an elevator in a downtown building.

It is thought little attention was paid to Pettibone before the arrest. When, it is said, was kept over his movements and he was arrested almost simultaneously with the others, but in a very secret manner. Neither of the Federation officials were informed of the other's arrest, and only when the three men were led out of separate cells this morning, preparatory to the journey to the depot, where the prisoners allowed the information that a triple arrest had been made the night before on warrants charging complicity in the murder of Idaho's ex-Governor.

Owing to the absence of Governor McDonald from the city last night no statement could be obtained concerning his action on the request of the Idaho authorities for the extradition of the Federation men. Over the long-distance telephone, however, Governor McDonald expressed himself as being surprised to learn that a special train was used to convey the officials of the Western Federation of Miners from Denver. He had no knowledge of a plan to spirit the men out of town.

"Last Thursday morning," said the Governor, "Deputy Warden Mills, of the Idaho Penitentiary, who had arrived in Denver the day before, called upon me at my office and presented the requisition papers for the arrest of the three men. Charges of complicity in the murder of ex-Governor Steunenberg were set forth. I spent all of that day as well as Friday and the greater part of Saturday, investigating the charges against the men, and in the end I honored the applications. I gave out no information about the papers being in my hands lest it should be a means of creating a movement to keep the men from the authorities who were in Denver to arrest them."

Governor McDonald was asked if any member of the Colorado National Guard was sent with the men as guards of the special train on its way out of Denver.

"Not to my knowledge," he replied. The Governor was then told that Adjutant-General Wells was absent from the city, and was pressed to answer if he had gone on the special train with the prisoners.

The Governor explained that General Wells had been granted a leave of absence by himself, and that if he had left for Boise on the special he went as a private citizen.

Fruits of Dishonesty.

New York, Feb. 16.—A year ago the presidents of three big insurance companies were vigorous men in mind and body and respected and revered as pillars of the financial structure of the nation. Here is their condition today:

John A. McCall, former president of the New York Life, dying at Lakewood, New Jersey, broken in fortune as well as bodily strength. Has cirrhosis of the liver and heart disease.

James W. Alexander, former president of the Equitable, dying in a sanatorium at Deerfield, Massachusetts having just suffered a second stroke of paralysis.

Richard A. McCurdy, former president of the Mutual Life, in a mental condition which alarms his family, physicians and friends, and his reputation irretrievably shattered. His fortune is intact, but he is confronted with suits for restitution which may cost him a great sum.

The first attack upon any of the big insurance companies or their official heads was made by Thomas W. Lawson when he began the serial publication of his "Frenzied Finance" in Everybody's. He openly charged mismanagement of trust funds and alleged that the insurance concerns were all manipulated by Wall street gamblers. His charges were taken up by President McCall of the New York Life and ridiculed as ridiculous and Lawson was openly accused of falsehood.

Then came the quarrel between young James Hazen Hyde and President Alexander of the Equitable, and the sensational charges resulting in the Frick committee investigation, followed by the legislative investigation. In this all the insurance companies were shown to have been illegally conducted and their trust funds and surplus used by schemers to float their various projects.

Among those whose reputations suffered from the inquiry were George W. Perkins, vice-president of the New York Life, whose funds were made use of by the firm of J. Pierpont Morgan & Co.; Chauncey M. Depew, who as a director of the Equitable loaned himself the association's funds on worthless security; Benjamin Odell, former governor, who has lost control of the Republican machine in New York through his connection with the insurance scandal; Senator Platt, who was also brought into the limelight as having collected campaign money from policy-holders' trust funds; E. H. Harriman, the railroad king, and Thomas F. Ryan, who quarreled as to which should pluck the Equitable surplus.

Sheepmen Gain Victory.

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 16.—In the district court Judge Stewart today held the state veterinarian law unconstitutional. If his decision is sustained by the supreme court it will wipe out the livestock sanitary board and the office of state veterinarian. The old state sheep inspection act, will, however, be revived.

It is found by the court that the legislature sought to repeal the latter law by mere reference to it, extending the duties of sheep inspector to the new office of state veterinarian. The litigation arose over an order that all sheep south of the Salmon river be dipped a second time last year before being driven in from the summer range. A number of sheepmen in Washington and Canyon counties refused on the ground that their sheep were free from scab, and that the board had no authority to order them dipped a second time.

This case was brought to test that point and the constitutionality of the law. Judge Stewart has held with the sheepmen on both points.

Acquitted of Kidnapping.

Omaha, Feb. 16.—The jury in the trial of Pat Crowe, charged with the robbery of Edward A. Cudahy, the Omaha packer, of \$25,000 in connection with the kidnapping of the latter's son five years ago, this afternoon, after 15 hours' deliberation, brought in a verdict of not guilty.

The kidnapping of Eddie Cudahy, December 19, 1900, and his release upon the payment by his father of \$25,000 ransom created a great sensation, and the search for the kidnapers was stimulated at the time by the offer of a reward of \$50,000 by Mr. Cudahy.

It was the belief of authorities that Crowe and James Callahan were the guilty parties, but no trace of them could be found until a year ago, when Callahan was arrested. He was identified by young Cudahy as one of his captors, but was released on trial, as it could not be shown that he received any of the money and there was at that time no law making the kidnapping of a person over 10 years of age a crime.

Last October Crowe was arrested in Butte, Mont., and was put on trial February 7. There was no evidence positively identifying Crowe as one of the kidnapers.

Crowe was recently indicted in Council Bluffs, with others, on a charge of holding up a street car.
