COUNTY COURT.

The county court met in regular session Wednesday of last week with Judge T. W. Ayers presiding and a full board present.

A franchise and right of way was granted C. E. Jones and others for a telephone line from Heppner to L. Cradick's ranch, the line to follow the county road by what is known as the Mallory ranch to the Wm. Hendricks' ranch, thence to James Nunamaker's, from Nunamaker's to the C. E. Jones' place to L. Cradicks, also from C. E. Jones, place to Hardman.

Henry Wright was appointed road supervisor for Cecil precinct.

In the matter of the petition of legal voters of Morrow county, to call an election for the purpose of voting on the question of prohibition under the provisions of the local option liquor law.

The petition having been regularly presented and containing 264 names which is more than 10 per cent. of the total vote cast at the last general election, as required by law, was granted.

In the matter of establishing county road, petition of W. B. Finley, et al.

It was ordered by the court that J. J. McGee, H. Scherzinger and S. P. Devin be appointed viewers, and J. J. McGee surveyor, to meet on the 26th day of March to view the road and to report at the next meeting of the court.

UNUSUAL STORM.

Worst Weather Ever Known in March in Morrow County.

The unusual storm that has prevailed over a greater part of the Pacific Coast for the past week has been remarkable in many ways.

Here in Morrow county the past winter has been only so in name. There has not been what could be called a bad storm. March opened with every indication of spring. Children were out on the hillsides with flower picking parties gathering arm loads of butter cups and other wild flowers that were springing forth everywhere from the effect of the spring sun.

Saturday a north wind came up and increased to great velocity before subsiding. The cold north winds swept through the pass of the Columbia river, carrying and banking up the sand, which was a serious menace to railroad traffic.

This sand and dust was carried in the atmosphere for many miles. Sunday morning the atmosphere was full of dust and hung in clouds over Heppner, while everything was covered with the falling dust particles that had been caused by the winds.

Following close in the wake of the wind storm came the white tiger of the north, and from warm spring weather the thermometer suddenly dropped fully 70 degrees, touching zero.

The people of Heppner were taken unawares and bursted water pipes were common all over the city.

From present appearances Morrow county people do not feel alarmed over the results of the storm, however, the weather is still cold and the damage if any cannot yet be ascertained.

The cold wave was accompanied with a heavy snow storm. It is certainly fortunate that the snow came from the north. The wheat belt is well covered. It is reported that in Sand Hollow, the snow reached a depth of eight inches. In the Gooseberry country the ground is covered a depth of from eight to ten inches. In fact all over the wheat country the ground is well covered.

With the warm weather previous to the storm, wheat was growing very rapidly. Grain was tender and rank, and while not in condition to stand zero weather, still the snow will be a great protection and it is not likely that the crop will be materially injured.

Stock interests are well protected. Stockmen have plenty of feed to carry them through for a reasonable length of time.

The worst feature is the fact that the lambing season is almost here. In fact, a few early lambs are already coming and it will be hard work to save them.

Early fruits will undoubtedly be killed, but as the fruit here is of little commercial importance, not much is thought of it.

The only fear entertained is for the wheat crop, and at present it is thought to be safe.

The Oregonian has published a very complete report of the storm from all over the state. While the headlines present an optimistic view, still the fact remains that considerable damage will result from the severe cold weather.

In Wasco county, fears are entertained for the wheat crop. Early fruit will be injured.

In Baker county the snow fall was the heaviest for 16 years, ranging from 19 inches in the low lands to four and one half feet in the mountains. Stock will suffer greatly and many sheep will perish.

In the vicinity of Blalock in Gilliam county wheat will be greatly damaged.

In Western and Southern Oregon early fruits are injured, but otherwise there will be no serious results.

In the Blue mountains south of Heppner, there was a heavy snow fall.

H. M. CAKE FOR SENATOR.

Will Make Vigorous Campaign on Sound Platform.

Following is the platform upon which H. M. Cake will go before the people of Oregon as a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States Senator:

I believe the public service corporations should be subject to governmental regulation and control. The power of regulation should be vested in the Interstate Commerce Commission, and should be exercised with due regard to the respective rights of the people and the corporations.

Trusts or combinations of capital organized for the purpose of controlling the utilities and necessities of the country, to the exclusion of legitimate competition, are contrary to public policy; and should come under the ban of the law.

I believe in preserving the dignity of our American citizenship, and the freedom of the laboring classes of this country, and hence I am opposed to the admission of the coolie labor of China, and the undesirable classes of Continental Europe.

The growing commerce of Oregon demands the deepening of the bar of the Columbia river, the construction of the Dallas-Celilo Canal; the opening of the upper Columbia; the improvement of Coos Bay, Tillamook and Yaquina harbors; the dredging of the Willamette and the Government ownership of the Locks at Oregon City and Federal appropriations should be made securing these improvements.

A tariff should be maintained for the protection of American industries and American labor. Where, however, the necessity for protection is removed by the growth and development of a particular industry, the tariff should be modified to meet the changed conditions.

The reclamation of the arid lands is one of the pressing needs of the Northwest, and a condition to its greater development, and the efficiency of the reclamation service should be one of the first cares of the Federal Government.

The Federal Constitution should be amended to provide for the election of United States Senators by direct vote of the people.

I am in favor of the establishment of the parcels post.
