Shears on Big Scale.

With the intention of looking over  
Baker county and possibly setting up  
one of his big sheep shearing plants here  
during the coming season, N. H. Cottrell  
of Boise, Idaho, the owner of the largest  
sheep shearing business in the United  
States and in fact in the world, arrived  
in Baker City this morning, says the  
Baker City Herald.

Mr. Cottrell stated that he was not  
sure whether he will come into Oregon  
during the coming season or not. He  
runs four plants of from 25 to 30 ma-  
chines each in Idaho each year and  
shears approximately 400,000 sheep.  
Although for a number of years Mr. Cot-  
trell made his home in Pendleton, he  
does not shear in Oregon any more and  
Baker county will be the only place in  
this state which he will work in case he  
does come here.

The number of sheep handled each  
year by the employes of Mr. Cottrell is  
enormous. Of course it depends upon  
the man he has operating the machine,  
how many sheep will be sheared each  
day, but with good operators the Boise  
man estimates that at each plant he can  
handle from 2500 to 3000 sheep daily.  
About 42 men are employed upon each  
plant of 30 machines.

Mr. Cottrell will spend several days  
with the big sheepsman of Baker county  
and if he finds that it will pay him to  
bring one of his plants into Oregon he  
will have it shipped to this place and be  
upon the field when the shearing com-  
mences.

## JONATHAN BOURNE, JR.



Republican Candidate for United States Senator.

### Champion of Statement One

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate be-  
fore the Republican primaries for the  
nomination of United States Senator in  
Congress, for the long term commencing  
March 4, 1907, was born in New  
Bedford, Mass., February 23, 1855; was  
a member of the class of 1877 at Har-  
vard University; came to Portland May  
16, 1878; was a Republican member of  
the Oregon Legislature in the session of  
1885 and the extra session of 1886; was  
one of Oregon's delegates to the Republi-  
can National Convention of 1888 and  
Oregon's member of the Republican  
National Committee from 1888 to 1892,  
and a delegate to the Republican Na-  
tional Convention of 1892; and was  
elected as a Mitchell Republican to the  
Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more promi-  
nently identified with the development  
of the mineral resources of Oregon than  
any other man in the state, having ex-  
pended in the last 20 years over \$1,000,-  
000 of his own money in the acquisition  
and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his resi-  
dence and main office at Portland since  
1878, he has had another office at New  
Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the  
business of his father's estate since 1889,  
which makes him familiar with many of  
the large interests and leading men in  
the East. These qualifications, in con-  
junction with his energy, originality,  
executive ability and experience in  
business and political affairs pre-emi-  
nently qualify him for making an able  
and influential Senator for the State of  
Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored ex-  
tending the direct power of the people  
over their government as far as possi-  
ble. He was one of the leading spirits  
in the Initiative and Referendum move-  
ment from 1896 until it was approved by  
the voters at the June election in 1902.  
In 1904 he was a member of the execu-  
tive committee of the direct Primary  
Nominations League, and holds the  
same position with the People's Power  
League at this time. In all these move-  
ments he has been one of the few to  
guarantee the necessary expenses of  
preparing and proposing their measures  
to the people.

He says that the choice of United  
States Senator should be by direct vote  
of the people, and that the Legislature  
should be compelled to elect the man  
the people select. To accomplish this  
result, he is championing Statement No.  
1 of the primary elections law as the  
only method by which public opinion  
may be crystallized and made effective  
upon the Legislature.

In his petition for nomina-  
tion he says:

"If I am nominated and  
elected I will, during my  
term of office, Favor: Re-  
publican Politics. Amend-  
ing National Constitution  
for People's Election of Unit-  
ed States Senators. Pub-  
licity Political Campaign Ex-

penses. National Control of  
Corporations in Interstate  
Commerce. Rigid Exclusion  
of Asiatic Coolie Labor;  
Good Wages Make Good  
Citizens. Legal Limitation  
Labor Hours for Safety on  
Railroads. Parcels Post, in-  
cluding Rural Delivery.  
Pure Food Laws. Liberal  
Appropriations for Panama  
Canal, Coast Defenses, River  
and Harbor Improvements,  
Including Columbia, Willa-  
mette Rivers, Coos, Yaquina  
and other Oregon Harbors,  
Cello Canal, Government  
Canal at Oregon City. Fair  
Share of Irrigation Fund for  
Oregon. Loyal Support of  
Successful Candidates. Rigid  
Enforcement Statement One.  
Roosevelt for Second Elec-  
tive Term. I desire that  
the following statement be  
printed after my name on  
the nominating ballot:

I WILL SUPPORT PRES-  
IDENT ROOSEVELT'S DE-  
TERMINATION THAT JUST-  
ICE BE DONE ALL MEN."
