The following is the schedule as made out by the secretary and it will be followed during the season, though some changes may be found necessary: Pendleton, May 22 and 23; June 5. Heppner, May 25; June 8; June 22. Co. 4 n, May 29; June 27. Shaniko, May 31; June 1; June 19 and 20; July 10. Wallows, June 12; June 29. Baker City, June 14; July 12. Last year no sales days were held at Condon or Baker City.

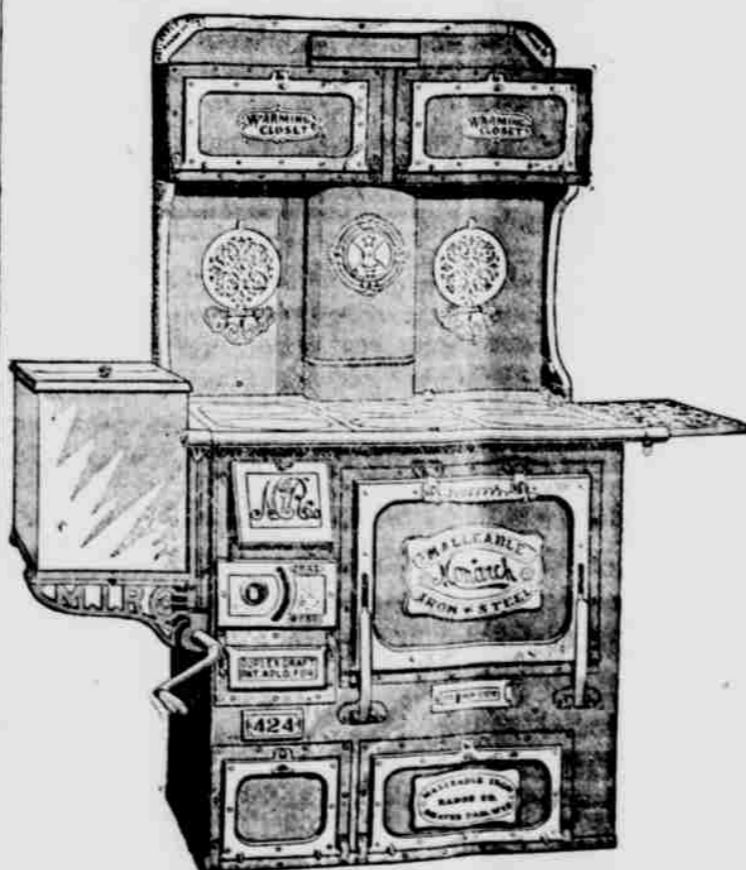
