TO KEEP OUT SHEEP.

Oregon Attorney - General Quotes
Decision of Supreme Court of
Idaho to Show That Law
Is Valid.

Salem, March 27 — That the act of the
legislature of 1905, imposing a tax of 20
cents a head on sheep driven into the
state of Oregon from other states, is
valid and can be enforced is the opinion
of Attorney-General Crawford, who so
advised District Attorney Phelps, of
Pendleton, today. In this law may be
found some solution of the dispute that
has arisen in Umatilla County over the
question of grazing privileges in the
Wenaha forest reserve.

Recently a case involving this law
was tried before Judge Ellis and de-
cided adversely to the law. It is under-
stood that Judge Ellis declared the law
invalid because it imposed a tax not
equal in its application.

Attorney-General Crawford does not
view the tax as a revenue tax of the
ordinary kind, but as a license fee that
is required to be paid to the state for the
privilege of bringing sheep here to be
pastured. The collection of this tax
would be an exercise of the police
power, in the opinion of Mr. Crawford,
and governed by the principle laid
down by the Supreme Court of the
State of Idaho and by the courts of
other states. In Idaho, in the case of
Spencer vs. Morgan, the Supreme Court
said:

In every state the keeping of live-
stock is under police regulation. The
clash of interest between stockraising
and farming calls for the interference of
the state by the institution of police
regulations; and whether the regula-
tions shall subordinate the stockraising
interest to that of farming, or vice versa,
in the case of an irreconcilable dif-
ference, as is the case with respect to
the going at large of cattle, is a matter
for the legislative discretion and is not a
judicial question. In the exercise of
this general power of control over the
keeping of livestock, the state or munici-

Republican Candidate for United States Senator.

Champion of Statement One

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate be-
fore the Republican primaries for the
nomination of United States Senator in
Congress, for the long term commencing
March 4, 1907, was born in New
Bedford, Mass., February 23, 1855; was
a member of the class of 1877 at Har-
vard University; came to Portland May
16, 1878; was a Republican member of
the Oregon Legislature in the session of
1885 and the extra session of 1886; was
one of Oregon's delegates to the Republi-
can National Convention of 1888 and
Oregon's member of the Republican
National Committee from 1888 to 1892,
and a delegate to the Republican Na-
tional Convention of 1892; and was
elected as a Mitchell Republican to the
Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more promi-
nently identified with the development
of the mineral resources of Oregon than
any other man in the state, having ex-
pended in the last 20 years over \$1,000,-
000 of his own money in the acquisition
and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his resi-
dence and main office at Portland since

1878, he has had another office at New
Bedford, Mass., and has carried on the
business of his father's estate since 1889,
which makes him familiar with many of
the large interests and leading men in
the East. These qualifications, in con-
junction with his energy, originality,
executive ability and experience in
business and political affairs, pre-emi-
nently qualify him for making an able
and influential Senator for the State of
Oregon.

Mr. Bourne has always favored ex-
tending the direct power of the people
over their government as far as possi-
ble. He was one of the leading spirits
in the Initiative and Referendum move-
ment from 1896 until it was approved by
the voters at the June election in 1902.
In 1904 he was a member of the execu-
tive committee of the direct Primary
Nominations League, and holds the
same position with the People's Power
League at this time. In all these move-
ments he has been one of the few to
guarantee the necessary expenses of
preparing and proposing their measures
to the people.

He says that the choice of United
States Senator should be by direct vote
of the people, and that the Legislature
should be compelled to elect the man
the people select. To accomplish this
result, he is championing Statement No.
1 of the primary elections law as the
only method by which public opinion
may be crystallized and made effective
upon the Legislature.

In his petition for nomina-
tion he says:

"If I am nominated and
elected I will, during my
term of office, Favor: Re-
publican Politics. Amend-
ing National Constitution
for People's Election of Unit-
ed States Senators. Pub-
licity Political Campaign Ex-
penses. National Control of
Corporations in Interstate
Commerce. Rigid Exclusion
of Asiatic Coolie Labor;
Good Wages Make Good
Citizens. Legal Limitation
Labor Hours for Safety on
Railroads. Parcels Post, in-
cluding Rural Delivery.
Pure Food Laws. Liberal
Appropriations for Panama
Canal, Coast Defenses, River
and Harbor Improvements,
Including Columbia, Willa-
mette Rivers, Coos, Yaquina
and other Oregon Harbors,
Celilo Canal, Government
Canal at Oregon City. Fair
Share of Irrigation Fund for
Oregon. Loyal Support of
Successful Candidates. Rigid
Enforcement Statement One.
Roosevelt for Second Elec-
tive Term. I desire that
the following statement be
printed after my name on
the nominating ballot:

**I WILL SUPPORT PRES-
IDENT ROOSEVELT'S DE-
TERMINATION THAT JUST-
TICE BE DONE ALL MEN."**
