Frank C. Baker, chairman of the Republican State Committee has resigned. Mr. Baker has been the most active chairman ever associated with the state committee. During his term of office for the past three years he has labored zealously for the best interests of the party. As an earnest and effective worker Mr. Baker deserves great credit.

The year 1906 promises to be one of the greatest activity and growth in the history of Portland. Already a half dozen or more modern sky scrapers have been planned for erection this year in Oregon's metropolis. Portland already has the foundation built for a large city and it is only a question of time and not a great length of time either when Portland will have double the present population. Practically the bulk of the business of Oregon is centralized in the city of Portland and there can be no better indication of the growth of the state than in the growth of Portland. Portland cannot grow without prosperous conditions in the state.

Lewis Kinney, whose announcement appears in the Gazette as a candidate for the nomination for county clerk, is a deserving man with many friends in Morrow county. It is a well known fact that the office of county clerk is an important position and the citizens and taxpayers demand a competent and trustworthy official to fill this office. Mr. Kinney can be recommended as a capable and satisfactory man for the place. Naturally, he is accommodating and is well fitted for the office. In the endorsement of Mr. Kinney, the Gazette has the satisfaction of knowing that we are expressing the sentiment of a large number of Morrow county's solid citizens. JUDGE H. J. BEAN.

Judge H. J. Bean republican candidate for nomination as circuit judge of the sixth judicial district, was in Morrow county last week in the interest of his candidacy. Mr. Bean has a large number of old acquaintances in Morrow county. He has practiced law in this district the past twenty-five years, during which time he has made many warm friends.

He was admitted to the bar in the state of Maine, March 1881, and the following June he came to Pendleton, Oregon, where he has since enjoyed a good and growing practice. He was elected to the legislature in 1888. He also served two terms as district attorney, being elected to that office in 1896 and re-elected in 1898. He was also elected to the office of county judge of Umatilla county in 1904.

The judge is a life-long republican. His qualifications for the office of Circuit Judge are unquestioned by the leading attorneys of his district and all the people who know him. He will receive a good substantial support in both Umatilla and Morrow counties.

Judge E. B. Watson

Candidate for Republican Nomination for United States Senator, Long Term, Commencing March 4, 1907.

Judge Watson was born in Iowa and crossed the plains with his parents, one sister, two older and two younger brothers, in 1853. The family passed their first winter in Oregon in Lane county, near Eugene, and the next summer removed to Douglas county and settled on a farm. Judge Watson passed the next nine years on the farm and then attended Pacific University at Forest Grove, from which he was graduated in 1866, at the age of 21. He then read law with his oldest brother, the late Judge James Finney Watson, at Roseburg; was admitted to the bar in 1868, and located at Jacksonville, Or., for the practice of the law. He served one term as county judge, one term as county clerk, and one term as justice of the supreme court, while residing at Jacksonville, and then removed to Portland, where he has ever since resided, engaged in the practice of his profession.

Judge Watson is not a new man in politics or public life. His long and close application to the study and practice of the law has given him a place among the foremost lawyers of the state, and may be presumed to have qualified him in a marked degree to participate in the discussion and settlement of the great questions of law that are continually arising in the course of legislation by congress.

He is a Republican of the most pronounced type, and believes in maintaining the ascendancy of the Republican party in administration and control of public affairs. He believes in the necessity for internal improvements and in the right of the people of the State of Oregon to call upon the general government to appropriate sufficient funds for such purpose, and, if elected to the senate, will make every possible effort to obtain suitable appropriations for the speedy completion of the improvements already begun, and the initiation of such other works of the same character as may be proper and feasible. He believes in the principle of the protective tariff, but not in the retention of tariff laws after the necessity for protection has passed away, and, therefore, favors an "up-to-date" tariff revision. He believes in rural mail delivery and the extension of the mail service to include the proposed system of parcels post. He is profoundly convinced that the great issue before the people of the United States at the present time is whether corporations and trusts shall continue to dominate political action and public legislation, as in times past or be forced to retire within their own proper sphere of activity and influence. And he believes in railroad rate legislation in accordance with the measure recently adopted by the house, and now pending in the senate, without amendment, attempting either to enlarge or restrain the ordinary jurisdiction of the courts; and that any such amendment would prove futile, if not mischievous.

And he especially favors such action by congress as will compel the present claimants of the railroad subsidy grants and Coos Bay military wagon road grant, in Oregon, to open the lands so granted to settlement and purchase, in accordance with the condition on which each of said grants was made, as follows: "That the lands granted by the act aforesaid shall be sold to actual settlers only, in quantities not greater than one quarter section to one purchaser, and for a price not exceeding \$2.50 per acre."

Judge Watson pledges himself, if elected to the senate to make every effort within his power to secure such legislation by congress as will cause these lands opened up to settlement and purchase.

Flat Salary for State Printer.

The only Republican candidate for State Printer who has declared for a flat salary is J. R. Whitney, the present incumbent. In his platform he says: "I have given this subject careful study, and believe there are two methods by which the cost of printing could be kept down to a minimum. One is to limit the volume of printing and revise the schedule of prices upon an up-to-date basis, the same as that of commercial printing generally. The other is for the State to own and operate its own printing plant, and to pay the State Printer a reasonable flat, fixed salary. Either of these plans, or similar plans along these lines, which the Legislature might adopt for the betterment of the service, would meet my hearty support."

Socialist Convention.
