NEW SHEARING PLANT.

Whetstone's Machines Will Soon be Ready For Work.

N. S. Whetstone who has purchased a sheep shearing plant consisting of 12 machines which will be furnished power by a gasoline engine, is now engaged in fitting up his plant at his ranch four miles east of town.

Mr. Whetstone has already contracted to shear about 30,000 head of sheep which will keep the plant busy for the season.

Mr. Whetstone will shear nearly all of the yearlings sold in the John Day country for Heppner delivery.

As it will be necessary to drive the sheep to Heppner for delivery, the shearing plant will save the owners of the sheep the cost of hauling the wool which would be quite an item of expense.

Machine shearing is an experiment in Morrow county, however, many are of the opinion that it will be a success.

The machines cut the wool much closer than it can be sheared by hand.

The Wattenburger crew will operate Mr. Whetstone's machines.

The final survey on the Eight Mile electric railroad commenced last Friday. The crew started at Rood Hill and will go to the Columbia, and then return and complete the other section south.

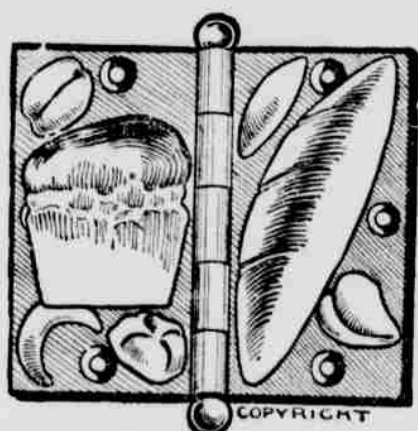

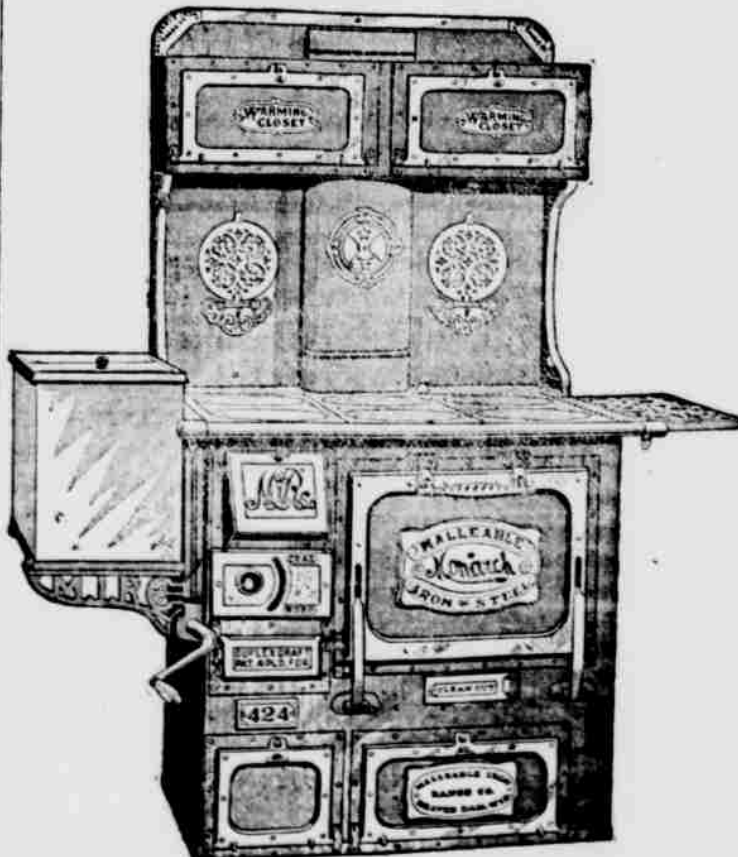
