

**SERIOUS CHARGES.**  
Henry Bode Charged With Attempt at Wholesale Poisoning.

Henry Bode, a German tailor well known in this city is in the county jail charged with an attempt to poison the guests at Miss Mary Behren's boarding house.

Heretofore Bode has been an inoffensive hard working man, but of late has been suffering with ill health. This coupled with family trouble has made him somewhat irritable.

Last Thursday morning a number of the guests came down to breakfast as usual at Miss Behren's boarding house. Robert Gaynor, one of the guests was the first to drink coffee and as soon as he tasted it he felt that something was wrong.

He spoke of the coffee tasting bad and said that it was sour. Thinking that the trouble came from the milk Mr. Gaynor called for another cup of coffee with milk. He took a swallow of this and found the same trouble.

Mr. Gaynor kept on with his breakfast for a few minutes until he commenced to turn deathly sick. After a severe spell of vomiting he recovered, however he was sick for several days.

The contents of the coffee pot and teakettle were taken to Patterson's drug store and from the tests given the indications were that the water and coffee contained oxalic acid.

Some of the contents of the coffee pot and teakettle will be sent to Portland for analysis.

Thursday evening Mr. Gaynor caused the arrest of Bode charging him with an attempt at poisoning. He was locked up in the county jail. District Attorney Phelps came over from Pendleton Monday for Bode's hearing, but he waived examination and was bound over to await the action of the circuit court. His bonds were placed at \$1,000 which so far he has been unable to furnish.

**Death of Bishop Morris.**

Bishop Benjamin Wistar Morris, for 38 years missionary bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church in Oregon, died at his residence, 635 Everett street, in this city last night. Death was caused by a complication of heart and stomach troubles. He had been failing with age for some time and a fainting spell caused by heart trouble Thursday night confined him to his bed. From that time until his death he sank steadily and medical assistance was of no avail. His wife, more than 80 years of age, and his younger daughter were at his bedside when he died.

Bishop Morris was 87 years of age and for a month past has been suffering more or less severely from the troubles which resulted fatally. Last Thursday he attended a service at the Episcopal church, but complained then of feeling very ill and seemed very weak. That night while he sat in his home he was seized with a sinking spell which made him collapse completely. Dr. H. C. Wilson was summoned and cared for the patient day and night from that time until the end, but the aged minister grew weaker steadily and early last night the doctor informed the family that he could not survive much longer.

The death of Bishop Morris marks the passing of a pioneer and one of the most distinguished religious and missionary workers on the Pacific coast. He built up the Episcopal field in both Washington and Oregon, raised large sums of money to further the cause and was instrumental in the establishment of several public institutions in this city which stand today as fitting crowns to the success of his labors.

Consecrated Bishop Benjamin Wistar Morris served in the ministry for 60 years, and during 38 years of that time was the bishop of Oregon. He was next to the oldest bishop in America, and had he survived Bishop Tuttle of Missouri, would have succeeded him as presiding bishop of the Protestant Episcopal church in America. He was an indefatigable worker and the missionary field was his chosen line. It was through his able handling and untiring efforts that the Episcopal missions in Oregon and Washington were brought to their present standard. He was a pioneer in religious work in this state, and there are many monuments standing as witnesses of his labors.—Portland Journal.

**BURNED TO DEATH.**

Baby Son of Wm. Barratt Lost in Flames.

The three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Barratt, who reside near this city, was burned to death last Saturday evening in a fire which destroyed the residence.

News of the sad affair was telephoned to this city and R. F. Hynd, Geo. Conser, Frank Roberts and Dr. Kistner immediately drove out to the scene of the unfortunate accident.

At the time of the fire Mrs. Barratt was at home alone with her three small children.

Mr. Barratt was away at a sheep camp and a hired man was at work about a mile away.

While Mrs. Barratt was engaged with her household duties the child was playing in the woodshed which adjoined the residence, making mud pies.

Hearing the frantic screams of her little five-year-old daughter, Mrs. Barratt ran out to the woodshed when the building was a mass of flames.

The little boy had failed to get out and the fire was burning so rapidly that Mrs. Barratt could do nothing.

The flames from the burning woodshed soon leaped to the residence which was soon a roaring furnace, nothing being saved.

The child's body was entirely consumed only a few bones being left to tell the awful story.

In the woodshed there was a box of coal, and the indications are that the child was in the coal box or very near it, the burning coal made the heat intense where the body was.

In trying to find the missing child Mrs. Barratt was severely burned about the face.

The remains were brought to this city and buried in the Heppner cemetery Sunday.

Mr. Barratt's property loss is about \$2,000, with \$700 insurance.

**FEEL SEVEN STORIES.**

Homer Hallock Meets Tragic Death in Portland.

The tragic death of Homer H. Hallock who was killed in attempting to escape from the fire in the Chamber of Commerce building in Portland, last Friday afternoon, was the cause of general comment in this city as soon as the news was heard Friday evening.

Mr. Hallock is a brother of Mrs. W. P. Dutton, of this city, and a brother-in-law of Mrs. Delia Hallock, also of this city. His parents were very early pioneers of Morrow county and he lived for some time with his parents in an early day in Heppner. Mr. Hallock was a pioneer newspaper man of Heppner, having started the Heppner Times. He was well liked by all who knew him.

The following account of his tragic end is taken from the Oregonian of Saturday:

Homer H. Hallock, who lived at 186 Fourth street, the father of four children, and an employee of the Willamette Valley Traction Company, met death during the fire yesterday afternoon. In trying to escape from the burning building by way of a fire escape on an inside court, he fell to a skylight ledge seven stories below, and was crushed to death.

In the excitement in trying to escape, many members rushed to the window of the inside court and descended two small fire escapes which led to an open window on the seventh floor, by which means they could gain entrance to the stairs. Several made their way to safety by this means, but Hallock becoming impatient of delay tried to reach the fire escape from a side window not leading directly to the ladder. He scrambled upon the ledge of the window, and as spring the sill with one hand attempted to reach the ladder with the other. He lost his balance. Seeing that he was going to fall, he grabbed at two small electric wires which supported him for a moment and then broke. Endeavoring wildly to grasp at something for support, Hallock plunged from the eighth floor to the ledge on the skylight, seven stories below. Persons who saw the man fall turned from the windows at the sight, although smoke and flames were pouring around them. Hallock was killed instantly, and it is said, never moved a muscle after reaching the ledge.

His body was removed from the skylight during the progress of the flames and was carried to the entrance to the court on the Stark street side.

When Mr. Hallock was killed by falling into the court of the Chamber of Commerce building, his 9-year-old son, Joseph, was one of the thousands of persons outside the building who had been attracted to the conflagration. The little boy was standing on the sidewalk, looking up towards the fire which was leaping from the windows of the Commercial Club, when he heard a bystander remark that his father had been killed. This was one of the most pathetic incidents in connection with the fire.

Deputy District Attorney G. C. Moser, who was intimately acquainted with Mr. Hallock, was the person who made the remark that was overheard by the

little boy. At the time he was talking to H. W. Goddard. Mr. Moser noticed the little boy standing near him, but did not know who he was.

"Homer Hallock was killed by falling," said Mr. Moser to Mr. Goddard. "What did you say?" questioned the boy in a whisper. "Oh, oh, that's my papa," he said, breaking into tears and almost fainting.

Mr. Moser took the boy to his office, where he was placed in charge of the stenographer. He then went to the home of Mr. Hallock, 186 Fourteenth street, where he broke the news to Mrs. Hallock as gently as possible. Mrs. Hallock is heartbroken over the sad death of her husband. Mr. Hallock, who was about 48 years of age, is survived by four children, Blaine, who is employed in the offices of the O. R. & N.; Alma, a high school student; Mrs. James B. Welch and the little boy Joseph.

Mr. Hallock came to Portland about two years ago from Baker City. Before going to Baker City he was ticket agent at Pendleton, where he was a member of the Elks. Upon coming to Portland he was first employed in the offices of the O. R. & N. and later accepted the position of right-of-way agent for the Willamette Valley Traction Company.

**Swept by Tidal Wave.**

San Francisco, April 8.—The steamer Mariposa arrived today from Tahiti, bringing additional particulars of the storm which swept the Society and other South Sea Islands last February. According to the latest estimates about 150 lives were lost and the property damage amounted to \$1,500,000. Among the Mariposa's passengers were B. Chalee, C. Brown and J. Harris, members of the crew of the British ship County of Roxburgh, Captain J. Leslie, which went ashore during the hurricane at Tokara, in the Paumotu group of islands. Out of her crew of 24, ten lives were lost.

Other vessels lost during the storm were the French schooner Tahitiene, 53 tons, with Captain Dexter and eight of her crew, and the French schooner Tontout, 28 tons, with all on board. The French schooner Hitiutu, 19 tons, went ashore at Monihi. Her crew was saved. The French schooner Moruroa, 37 tons, went ashore at Tikehou, but the crew was saved.

The French schooner Eimeo, 150 tons, is overdue and it is supposed that she is lost with all on board off Tikehou. Thirty-seven cutters of 12 to 15 tons were also lost in the storm.
