EARTHQUAKE AND FIRE

CITY OF SAN FRANCISCO PAR-
TIALY DESTROYED.

GREAT LOSS OF LIFE

Palo Alto Entirely Destroyed--Five Hundred
Killed at Santa Rosa--Five Killed at Oak
land--Other Towns Are Damaged.

Portland, Ore., April 19, 8:30 a. m.—Latest reports
from San Francisco confirm the awful disaster caused by
earth quake and fire yesterday.

The first shock occurred at 5 o'clock a. m., yesterday
morning, and was followed by another at 8 a. m., with
two more in the afternoon, destroying the Call, Examiner,
Chronicle, Flood, Emporium, Palace Hotel, St. Francis
Hotel and many other buildings. Reports of the loss of
life are meager and conflicting. Estimates of the number
killed run all the way from 200 to 2000 with 7000
injured.

The Cliff House was washed away with a tidal wave.
The city took fire soon after the morning shocks and
at 8:30 this morning is still raging in both the business
and residence portions.

The water mains were broken and the fire department
is almost helpless. A crevice of great depth and six feet in
width was opened up on Valencia street. The property
loss is estimated at \$200,000,000.

UMATILLA WORK ASSURED.

Bids for Cold Spring Dam Will
Be Advertised.

Assurance that work will soon begin
upon the vast Umatilla irrigation pro-
ject comes with the announcement that
bids for the construction of the Cold
Springs dam will be called for during
the present week, made yesterday by
D. C. Henny, supervising engineer of
the United States Reclamation Service
for Oregon and Washington. The con-
struction of the dam will be the first
step toward one of the greatest reclama-
tion projects now under consideration
by the Department of the Interior. It
is believed that its completion will be
followed in the near future by construc-
tion of canals and irrigating ditches and
that the great acreage of the Umatilla
section will be made fit for cultivation as
quickly as large forces of men and teams
can perform the necessary work.

The Umatilla project involves the re-
demption of approximately 20,000 acres
of arid land. It was first taken up in
the Summer of 1905, and the rapidly
with which the plans have been rushed
to their present stage speaks well for
Engineer Henny and his assistant, E.
G. Hopson, of the Portland office.

Every detail of the project has now
been worked out, and it only remains
for the separate contracts to be let and
the work carried through. The Cold
Springs dam, for which bids will im-
mediately be called, will contain about
700,000 cubic yards of material. It will
be 90 feet high and 4000 feet long, and
will form a huge reservoir in which the
water for irrigation purposes will be
stored. Soon after the bids on the dam
have been let, it is expected that con-
tracts will be given out for the digging
of the 25 mile canal which will bring the
water from Umatilla River to the re-
servoir, and that work will progress
upon the two simultaneously.

A network of ditches will spread out
from the dam to carry the water to all
parts of the land which is to be reclaim-
ed. There is no doubt but that the
Umatilla country will become one of

JONATHAN BOURNE, JR.



Republican Candidate for United States Senator.

Champion of Statement One

Jonathan Bourne, Jr., candidate be-
fore the Republican primaries for the
nomination of United States Senator in
Congress, for the long term commencing
March 4, 1907, was born in New
Bedford, Mass., February 23, 1855; was
a member of the class of 1877 at Har-
vard University; came to Portland May
10, 1878; was a Republican member of
the Oregon Legislature in the session of
1883 and the extra session of 1886; was
one of Oregon's delegates to the Repub-
lican National Convention of 1888 and
Oregon's member of the Republican
National Committee from 1888 to 1892,
and a delegate to the Republican Na-
tional Convention of 1892; and was
elected as a Mitchell Republican to the
Oregon Legislature in 1896.

Mr. Bourne has been more promi-
nently identified with the development
of the mineral resources of Oregon than
any other man in the state, having ex-
pended in the last 20 years over \$1,000,-
000 of his own money in the acquisition
and development of Oregon mines.

While Mr. Bourne has had his resi-
dence and main office at Portland since

He says that the choice of United
States Senator should be by direct vote
of the people, and that the Legislature

result, he is championing Statement No.

Canal at Oregon City. Fair
Share of Irrigation Fund for
Oregon. Loyal Support of
Successful Candidates. Rigid
Enforcement Statement One.
Roosevelt for Second Elec-
tive Term. I desire that
the following statement be
printed after my name on
the nominating ballot:

I WILL SUPPORT PRES-
IDENT ROOSEVELT'S DE-
