E. J. Burke has purchased M. S. Corrigan's wool on Butter creek. This was a fine lot of wool and consisted of 80,000 pounds. The purchase price was a shade better than 17 cents.

There was a special school meeting held at the council chamber Monday evening. The meeting was called for the purpose of making the property transfer which was purchased from the school district several years ago. The city bought the property from the school district, the price being \$1,000, but the deed had never been delivered. During the time of the Heppner flood the school records were destroyed, and the meeting was called for the purpose of clearing up the title.

Rev. Dr. Adding, of Chicago, is favorably mentioned as a possible successor to the late Bishop B. Wistar Morris. Dr. Frazier, of Cleveland, O., is another regarded as among the eligibles. No successor will be selected until the convocation of the diocese of Oregon is in session late in June. The sentiment is strongly in favor of selecting an able man for the position, though the salary paid is not considered much of an inducement. The Bishop of Oregon is paid \$3000 a year, with \$500 for traveling expenses and a house to live in.

The treasurer of the Morrow county Sunday School Association reports that he has received for the state work, from the Ione Congregational school, \$2; from the Lexington Congregational school, \$1.50; from the Lexington M. E. South school, \$2.50; from the Heppner M. E. South school, 90 cents, from the Heppner M. E. school, \$2.50. If you have not paid anything toward the state work and feel that you can pay the three cents per member asked for by the county association, please send your contribution to K. L. Beach, Lexington, before April 25. If you have not sent a report of your school since last May, or if your school shows a very different condition since your last report, please send a report to the secretary, S. E. Notson, Heppner, by April 25. The state convention meets in Portland May 1, and it is desired that the county be reported by that time to the state secretary.

Six sheep dipping vats will be installed along the Washington-Idaho state line by the government, according to Stock Inspector Henderson. Under the law all sheep going into the state of Idaho must be dipped. This is claimed to be due to the general cleanliness of the Idaho stock, and the stock inspectors stated that there was no sign of infection among any of the sheep in northern Idaho. All sheep leaving Washington and Idaho are compelled to submit to dipping, and when entering Idaho the one dipping suffices for the demand of both laws. The vats will probably not be constructed before May 1, or shortly after the shearing season. A dipping tank was installed at the Northern Pacific stock yard at Lewiston last fall, and this is used where the sheep do not pass as clean an inspection as is desired by the federal inspectors.

#### City Council

There was a meeting of the city council at the council chamber Monday evening. Councilmen Hynd, Garrigue, Minor, Kirk and Warnock answered to roll call with Mayor Gilliam in the chair.

A resolution was read authorizing the lease of the land on which the Heppner Commercial Club building stands to the Heppner Improvement company for a period of 99 years, which was made a part of the records of the meeting.

Another resolution was read and placed on record authorizing the sale of a lot belonging to the city to J. G. Crawford, for \$400.

Two more resolutions were also read authorizing the sale of a lot to Celus Keithley for \$150 and a lot to Cora D. Crawford for \$350.

The city also made the following purchases of lots for the opening of streets: Land from Mrs. Emma Welch on Main street for \$80. The Ben Matthews lot on Main street was purchased by the city, the purchase price being \$80. Mrs. Sarah A. Shipley was given a warrant for \$200 for land near the Heppner warehouse for the opening of a street.

#### FRUIT CROP BADLY INJURED.

Apple Crop of Morrow County Practically Killed.

Developments now show that the fruit crop of Morrow county was badly injured by the cold weather of last month.

Fruit Inspector Harry Cummings who recently made a tour of inspection in the Butter creek country and other parts of the county informs the Gazette that the apple crop is practically killed. Cherries, pears, peaches and other fruits are badly injured. Many orchards will not have any fruit at all and the fruit crop of the county will be very short.

Mr. Cummings states that none of the trees were injured to speak of.

While the freezing weather killed the fruit it will be of some little benefit. The cold killed the San Jose scale. Only in three places in the county was Mr. Cummings able to find any scale. He says that the people generally who own orchards in this county are willing and anxious to co-operate with the fruit inspector to eradicate the fruit pests.

#### DIED.

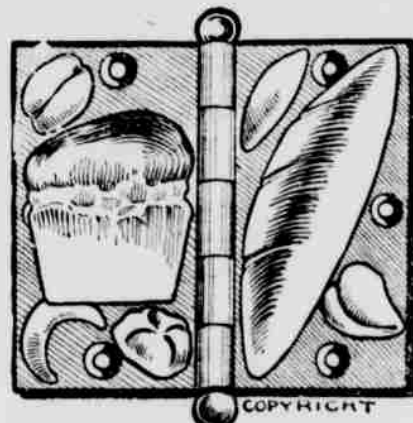

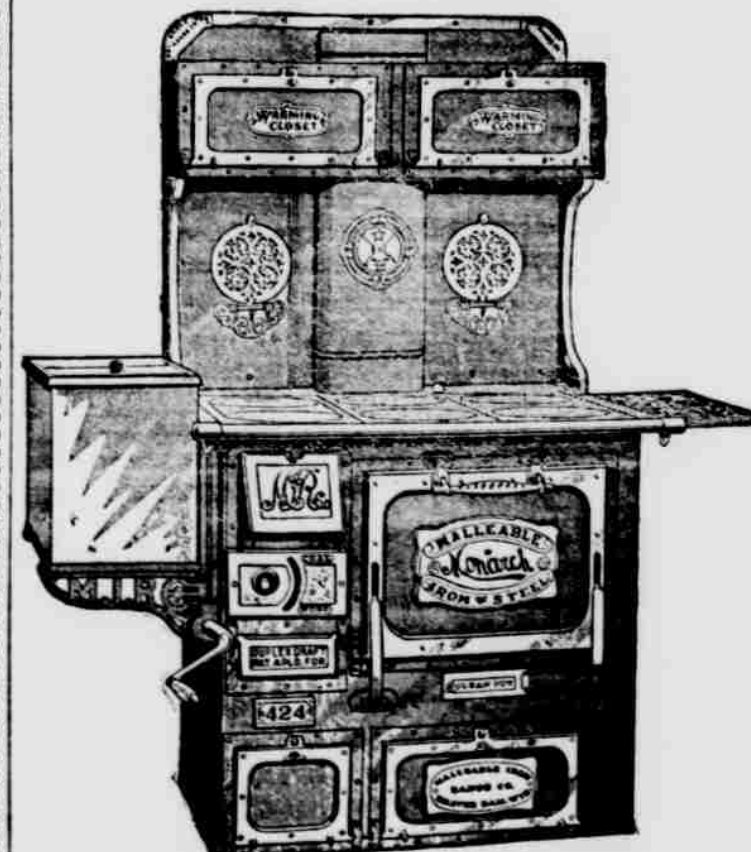
