HE DREADS HENRY.

Hermann Suddenly Anxious To Hasten Trial.

Washington, D. C., April 21.—Rep-
resentative Hermann, who only a few
weeks ago was availing himself of every
technicality to postpone trial in the
Supreme Court of the District of Colum-
bia, on the letterbook indictment, has
suddenly grown anxious to face a jury.
No sooner was Hermann notified that
the Government would like to postpone
his trial because Mr. Henry has been
obliged to return to San Francisco, than
he entered a stout protest and came for-
ward with a demand that his trial begin
next Wednesday, as recently ordered
by the court.

Hermann's attorneys notified District
Attorney Baker today that they were
unwilling to allow further postpone-
ment. Hermann has made all prepara-
tion for trial. He has summoned
several witnesses from Oregon, who
came and are here at his expense, and
has gone to other expense and the at-
torneys state that their client is entitled
to an immediate hearing, insisting that
the prosecution be conducted by District
Attorney Baker in the absence of Mr.
Henry.

It so happens that Mr. Henry worked
up the case and was prepared to go to
court and conduct the prosecution,
while Mr. Baker is not prepared and
would be seriously handicapped if re-
quired at this late day to take up a case
with which he is not familiar. It is
noted that no sooner had Mr. Henry
left Washington for San Francisco than
Hermann showed signs of intense eag-
ness to stand trial, but this is the first
time such symptoms have been noticed.
In view of the fact that the Govern-

ment would be seriously handicapped if
compelled to go on with Hermann's
trial during the coming week, it is ex-
pected that the case will be continued
until the Fall term of court. Notice
was today served on Hermann's attor-
neys to appear in court Monday and
show cause why trial should not be
postponed until Mr. Henry can return
to Washington. Had Hermann been as
ready for trial a month ago, when the
Government wanted to go ahead, as he
is today, he would stand a better chance
of winning out in this controversy with
Mr. Baker.

World's Sheep King.

The American Sheep Breeder gives
the following account of the sheep king
of the world, who rules over 1200
square miles of territory and owns 750-
000 sheep:

Ruler over a territory of 1200 square
miles, with a frontage of 270 miles of
wind-swept sea coast, G. L. Waldron,
the sheep king of the world, now in this
country from Patagonia to study the
meat packing industry, has arrived in
Los Angeles.

Mr. Waldron, in addition to supervising
his little kingdom, portions of
which he does not see often than once
in three years, also has two packing
houses, employing 600 men and having
an annual capacity of 70,000 sheep, the
size of each year's slaughter.

The great ranch is situated on the
tapering point of the southern continent,
runes along the coast of Argentina to
face the Atlantic, borders the straits of
Magellan, and on the Pacific includes a
portion of Chile.

In addition, most of the island of
Tierra del Fuego, with 40,000 acres of
the Falkland islands, is under the con-
trol of this man. He is manager and
largest owner in the Patagonia Sheep
Raising company, upon whose preserve
three-quarters of a million sheep feed,
and whose output of wool is 1,500,000
pounds annually.

In all the wide stretch of territory
there is not a city, but seven stations
mark the places where once in three
months the herders congregate.

During the Boer war this company
furnished the English army with its
fresh meat. At the present time the
cold storage method of preserving meats
has been done away with and the com-
pany is now putting up its mutton in
tins, to be sold in all parts of the
civilized world.

Mr. Waldron is on a tour of the world,
having already visited England, Africa,
India and Japan. From Los Angeles
he goes to Chicago to study the methods
of the great packing houses.
