The Gazette is in receipt of a communication from S. S. Terrell, forest supervisor, at Sumpster, calling attention to the examination of applicants for position of Forest Ranger, by the U. S. Civil Service Commission. These examinations will be held at Portland, Roseburg, La Grande and Prineville on the 14, 15 and 16 days of May, 1906. Applicants should apply at once to the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. for amended application form 1093, a copy of the "use" book, and a copy of "Information Regarding Employment on the National Forest Reserves." Applicants should indicate the point at which they intend to take the examination when applying for these forms.

HEPPNER BLACKMAN HOME.

Will Visit for a Month With His Parents.

Heppner Blackman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Blackman, of this city, was an incoming passenger from San Francisco, Monday evening. This is his first visit to Heppner since he left here almost four years ago. He is a rising young cartoonist. Just before the San Francisco disaster, Mr. Blackman was promoted to a good position on the San Francisco Bulletin. His work presents an original line of thought that was beginning to attract wide-spread attention, and his ability was recognized by one of the great dailies of the unfortunate Bay city. Naturally he feels discouraged over the future prospects of his line of work in San Francisco, and now contemplates going to New York where the field is larger.

Some of his recent work in caricature which attracted attention appeared just before the destruction of San Francisco. It was a monumental inscription with Rockefeller as the subject. Mr. Blackman's first work in caricature appeared in the Gazette almost five years ago, when he was a boy.
