NO ALLOTMENT THIS YEAR.

Stockmen Will Use Reserve By
Permission.

Morrow county sheepmen are
well pleased over the results of the
Forest Supervisors meeting at
Pendleton last week.

The Heppner Wool Growers'
Association was well represented
with the following delegates:
O. E. Farnsworth, D. O. Justus,
B. F. Hynd, J. L. Howard, John
Klikenny, besides a number of
sheepmen from the eastern part of
Morrow county.

While the meeting was called by
Supervisor Sheller only for the
purpose of receiving permits to
graze in the eastern division of the
Blue Mountain Forest Reserve,
there were many questions of in-
terest that came up and are now
better understood.

There was a very large attend-
ance of the sheep and cattle men
of Eastern Oregon and satisfactory
arrangements were made between
the sheep and cattle men through
their respective committees as to
what part of the reserve each
should occupy for the season of
1906.

No allotments will be made this
year, but the reserve will be used
by the sheep and cattle men in
common in their respective dis-
tricts.

All sheepmen who have regu-
larly used the reserve in former
years will be admitted this season
if application is made and by pay-
ing a fee of five cents per head for
sheep. The cattlemen will be
allowed the same privileges upon
the payment of 20 cents per head
for cattle.

No one will be allowed to take
in more stock this season that they
had on the reserve area last year.

A meeting of the Heppner Wool
Growers' Association was held in
this city Tuesday afternoon to
hear the report of the committee
that visited Pendleton. About 35
sheepmen were in attendance.

Members of the association who
did not attend the Pendleton
meeting filed out applications for
the coming season and these per-
mits will be forwarded to the
supervisor at Baker City where
another meeting will be held on
the 14th of this month.

The Heppner Wool Growers'
Association appointed a delegat-
ion of three consisting of W. B. Bar-
ratt, John Klikenny and George
Curran to represent the association
at the supervisors meeting at Aus-
tin on May 18.
