Since the trees have begun to leaf out it is now apparent that many of them were killed or injured by the unusual cold weather during the month of March. The unusual warm weather previous to the very cold spell in March caused trees to start to grow and this is what caused the damage. Over 50 per cent of the shade and ornamental trees of Heppner are injured. Many of them the tops are entirely killed while in several cases large trees are killed entirely. The locusts seem to have fared the worst. The beautiful grove of locusts back of the court house is injured badly. It seems that all of last year's growth on most of the trees is killed. A peculiar feature is the fact that the fruit trees stood the cold weather without much injury.

MEMORIAL SERVICES.

Grand Army Making Preparations for Proper Observance.

The Grand Army is making big preparations for the proper observance of Memorial day in this city.

The people in general are taking an active interest in the revival of the observance of this day in this county. For several years Memorial day has passed by with only passing notice, and the Gazette is pleased to announce that this day will this year be properly observed.

The program is already partly arranged as follows:

The procession will form on Main street at 10:30 a. m., in the following order: Lexington band, G. A. R., W. R. C., Odd Fellows and other orders followed by citizens.

The procession will march down Main street to Baltimore, west on Baltimore street to Gale, thence down Gale to the M. E. church, coming up Main street to the power house, and from the power house to Chase and May streets and back to Main street to I. O. O. F. hall.

The memorial services will be held at the M. E. church at 11 o'clock.

Fred W. Wilson, of The Dalles will deliver the oration at Robert's hall, where the speaking will commence at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

A general invitation is extended to everyone in Morrow county, and especially are old soldiers and mariners invited to come and help in the observance of the day when the nation mourns for the heroes of the great civil war.

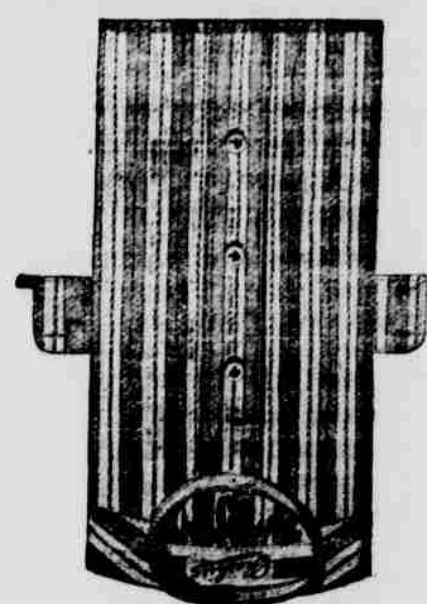
