Must Deliver Wool.

A special from the Salt Lake Herald
says:
A case of importance to the sheepmen
of the country has been decided in the
district court. The controversy was be-
tween H. Marx & Co., woolbuyers of
St. Louis, and R. Douglas & Co., wool-
growers of Pocatello, Idaho, upon a con-
tract for damages sustained by failure
on the part of the defendant to deliver
to the plaintiff a certain number of
fleeces of the clip of 1905.

The plaintiffs claimed that they should
have received 15,000 fleeces, whereas
they only received 8088. The jury found
in favor of plaintiff in the sum of \$1670.64

In the "Roll of Honor" just gotten
out by the "Financier" of New York
City, appears the First National Bank
of this city. Each year this paper
tabulates the national bank statistics
from their fall statements to the com-
ptroller of the currency, and prepares
therefrom what is called a "Roll of
Honor." There are about 6000 national
banks in the United States and the
First National of this city is only 85th
from the top; it is the only bank rep-
resented from this city and is second in
the state. And of the 810 banks rep-
resented in the "Roll of Honor," only
11 show a larger percentage of gain in
surplus and undivided profits for the
year 1905.—East Oregonian.

2687 beeves were shipped during Janu-
ary, February, March and April.

The first contract for the Klamath
government reclamation project has
been let to Mason, Doris & Co., for
\$400,000. It involves the removal of
700,000 yards of dirt. Details of the job
are a 3300-foot tunnel passing directly
beneath the town of Klamath Falls and
a canal nine miles long, 44 feet wide at
the bottom, and 75 feet wide at the top,
and 13 feet deep. The intake is at
Upper Klamath Lake.
