A. D. Stillman For Circuit Judge.

He was born on little old Granite creek in the mountain fastnesses of Grant county forty-two years ago, removing with his parents in 1872 to the Walla Walla river near Milton, since set off from Morrow county in what is now Morrow county.

His childhood was spent in the mountains of Grant county, his boyhood days

along the rivers and over the bunch grass hills where roamed the countless herds of the days before the wheat fields.

At twenty he commenced work in a planing mill and grew expert in handling woodworking machinery. At twenty-four his hard work and economy had supplied him with the means of
