THE COWARDLY ASSASSIN.

A man's political character is a proper subject of discussion; and so is his private character, if he aspires to public place. But it is cowardly, despicable and infamous to make anonymous attacks; the more so, of course, if they are malicious and false, as are the attacks on Jonathan Bourne, printed and circulated by thousands, in the hope of defeating him for the United States Senate.

Who are the cowardly calumniators and assassins, who do this work and shield themselves under anonymity? Evidently they are persons who have money to back their malignity, on the one hand, and their selfish desire to open the Senatorship to purchase, on the other. Circulars by tens of thousands cannot be printed and sent through the mails without money, and a good deal of it. What plutocrat, or group of plutocrats, is "putting up" for these anonymous defamations? They probably yet will be discovered, and branded with the infamy they deserve.

No creature is so despicable as he who uses the assassin's weapon of anonymous attack. Criticism of the political career of Jonathan Bourne, or of any other public man is, allowable, if done openly and decently; but even this never should be done by those who work in secrecy and concealment, afraid to avow themselves. Attacks on the personal and private character of public men by a malignant cowardice that conceals its own personality and utters calumnies from under cover, should be treated always with the contempt that such despicable work deserves. To an anonymous circular no right-minded person can pay any attention whatever; and if calumnies, the work can only excite loathing towards those guilty of it.

Taking some of these libelous circulars to the investigation committee of the Municipal Association of Portland, Mr. Bourne requested an inquiry into the charges they contain. Several persons, believed to be the authors or promoters of the accusations, were called to come and testify, but all of them refused or declined. The committee had no power to compel the attendance of witnesses, and the gentlemen who are known to be among those who carry the dagger of libel and slander in the sheath of anonymity refused to appear. Cowardly scoundrels, always, are those who pursue the work of secret defamation. But as some of these men are known, they yet probably will have the advantage, in spite of all their efforts for secrecy, to tell in open court what they pretend to know.

To oppose a man in politics is one thing, to defame his personal character is another, especially if it is done under the cover of a cowardly and malignant anonymity. Nothing that affects the character of men should be published anonymously. Fortunately, human nature is so constituted that such publications usually defeat the purpose of those who utter them.

The Oregonian has opposed Mr. Bourne on many occasions heretofore. In former years, when the money question was supreme, it differed from him most widely. That was ten years ago, and it is past. The Oregonian never questioned the honesty of his motives, and it gave him credit for the courage of his convictions. That was more than it could say for many or most of the conspicuous men of the Republican party who then were juggling with the money question. That contention, how-

ever, belongs to the past. It never will be renewed. No more forever will the gold standard be questioned. Mr. Bourne was no more in error on the money question, and far more honest, than a large majority of the active Republican politicians of Oregon; among whom are those now making on him these cowardly attacks from ambush, in the hope of advantage to themselves through party disorganization.—Oregonian.

Clip Goes East.

Boise, Idaho, May 26.—The wool situation has come to a head in this state. Worn out with the concerted efforts of the buyers to depress prices the woolgrowers will hold a meeting of their association June 4 and arrange to ship their clips East on consignment or under some other arrangement. This was the decision reached this evening by a number of representative growers. They communicated with President F. W. Gooding, of the state association and he agreed to call the proposed meeting at once.

The buyers have been offering 16 and 18 cents. No price has been offered upon by the growers, but it is evident they demand at least 6 cents more than that. Great unconcern has been manifested by the buyers. They go out a little and look at clips, but return without having made purchases.

The representative of the Lafayette Mills, who has made many purchases at prices better than 22 cents, was today called off by his company. This satisfied the growers that the dealers had brought pressure to bear and that the plot was a deep one. The action reported followed.

Child Scalded to Death.

North Yacima, Wash., May 16.—The 10-month-old child of Henry Anderson fell into a boiler of hot water at 1 p. m., Saturday. The mother left the child sitting on a chair near the boiler, while she went to the kitchen. When she returned the child was on its head in the water, dead.
