HEPPNER WILL CELEBRATE

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE
FOR A GRAND TIME.

Two Days of the Biggest Celebra-
tion Ever Held in Morrow
County.

Heppner will celebrate the glori-
ous Fourth of July.

The celebration will last for two
days and it will be the biggest
celebration ever held in Morrow
county.

In response to a call a meeting
was held in Roberts' hall Monday
evening and preliminary arrange-
ments were made.

No celebration has been held in
Heppner for six years and it is
generally conceded that this is
Heppner's time to celebrate. The
people generally are enthusiastic
and there is every indication of a
grand celebration.

At Monday's meeting E. C. Ash-
baugh was elected chairman and
S. E. Notson was appointed secre-
tary.

It was strictly a business meet-
ing in which all were working for
the same object. The success of
the celebration was the desired
end.

By motion Chairman Ashbaugh
appointed the following executive

Hicks, Garfield Crawford, S. E.
Notson, E. C. Ashbaugh.

The following program was out-
lined:

First day, July 4.

Great parade through principal
streets. Band, civic orders, cala-
thumpians, floats, liberty car,
ladies on horseback, etc.

After the parade there will be
platform exercises, including band
and vocal music, reading of
declaration of independence by S.
E. Notson and speaking.

The afternoon will be taken up
by races and varied amusements
for which liberal prizes will be
given to make keen competition in
the different events.

The second day will be just as
good as the first, in fact, some of
the principal events will be pulled
off on July 5, including a big bron-
cho busting tournament for a
liberal prize. There will also be a
big rooping contest on the second
day and a good ball game.

Heppner's big Fourth of July
celebration this year promises to
be a memorable event.

Two bands have already been
engaged, Ione and Lexington.
The big parade promises to be an
interesting feature. Indications
are now that Barnum's circus
would be a small affair in com-
parison with it. Heppner's many
resources for fun, noise and amuse-
ment will be exhausted in getting
up this feature. There will posi-
tively appear for the first and last
time the great and mighty Cala-
thumpians, the ugliest and biggest
in the land. Real cowboys, trained
in the saddle, with their horses
of almost human intelligence will

help to herd the big parade.

There will not be an idle
moment. There will be a contin-
uous round of pleasure both days.
In the evening there will be dan-
cing, and the citizens of Heppner
will take especial pains to see that
everyone who attends the celebra-
tion will have a good time.

A great feature of this celebra-
tion will be the riding and roping
contests. Liberal prizes will be
given and some of the best riders
in the northwest will compete.
No pains will be spared to get
horses that are wildest of the wild.
The wild and dangerous animals
will be handled by men who know
how and will certainly give an
exhibition in the difficult feats that
will be well worth coming to see.

In the roping contests, cattle as
wild as deer will be secured and
the knights of the rope will be
able to put on their best clothes
and make a showing that will be
full of excitement and a great
drawing card for the celebration.

Heppner will expect and will be
well prepared for a big crowd.
Heppner will entertain almost the
entire population of Morrow
county on July 4, besides a large
number from adjoining counties.

ASSESSORS RAISE VALUE.

**Southern Pacific to be Taxed On
High Basis.**

Albany, Or., June 11.—Nineteen
thousand dollars per mile for the
Southern Pacific Railway is the valuation
fixed by the Assessors of Western Ore-
gon in Albany today.

The Assessors of the counties along
the main line of the Southern Pacific
held the meeting for the purpose of dis-
cussing the question of railway assess-
ment, and, if possible, fixing a uniform
rate of assessment; also to determine
what should be the advance in railway
assessment, to keep step with the full-
valuation basis for all other properties
adopted in most of the counties.

The valuation of \$19,000 per mile is
notable, in that it troubles the assessed-
valuation of the Southern Pacific prop-
erties that has prevailed in the past.
The average valuation placed upon the
Southern Pacific stock in the past has
been about \$6000. The new valuation is
divided between rolling stock and road-
bed, the former being assessed at \$3000
and the latter at \$16,000. The Wood-
burn-Natron branch road will be as-
sessed at \$8000 per mile.

Nor did the heartless Assessors over-
look the Pullman Car Company. The
assessed valuation of the stock of this
concern in Oregon counties will be
raised from \$75 and \$100 per mile to
\$400.

Besides handling the railroads as de-
tailed above, and that was the prime
object of the meeting, considerable time
was devoted to the methods of arriving
at the proper valuation for other indus-
trial concerns and corporations and
banks.

In attendance at this meeting were:
Assessors B. D. Sigler, of Multnomah;
C. S. Graves, of Polk; J. F. Nelson, of
Clackamas; F. J. Rice, of Marion; D.
B. McKnight, of Linn; B. F. Keeney, of
Lane; George W. Staley, of Douglas,
and T. H. Davis, of Benton.
J. W. Morrow, of the tax department
of the Southern Pacific, appeared be-
fore the Assessors and spoke at some
length on behalf of the railway.
While the Assessors of the west side
division were not all in attendance,
those from Polk and Benton Counties
agreed that they would assess the rail-
road on the west side at \$10,000 per
mile.

This is the first time an effective
effort has been made to fix a uniform
assessment for the Southern Pacific in
all the counties along its line in Oregon.
In Multnomah County Assessor Sigler
will leave the figures as they are, at
\$20,000 per mile. The meeting lasted
all afternoon and adjourned at a late
hour tonight.

STOCKMEN MUST PAY

ADVANCE PAYMENT REQUIRED
FOR PERMITS.

Mounted Patrol Will be Main-
tained Throughout the
Reserve Districts.

Washington, D. C., June 8.

Dan P. Smythe, Pendleton, Ore.
The protest against the fees of the
Blue mountains reserve have been re-
ceived. I regret I cannot grant what
you ask as ample notice of the creation
of the reserve was given. The fee
charged is just and reasonable and the
payment will be required before the
issuance of permits. Judge Whitson's
decision affects only criminal prosecu-
tions for trespass. Griford Pinchot.

The above telegram shows that the
protest recently made by the Oregon
sheepmen against the payment of the
reserve tax has been turned down by
interior department at Washington, and
the bit of news contained therein is of
much interest to sheep and cattlemen in
this part of eastern Oregon.

While the stock men will suffer to
some extent under this ruling, the
county treasuries will be benefited, as
under the bill which creates this tax, 10
per cent. of it is to be divided among
the counties in which the reserve is
situated. According to the terms of the
bill, a tax of 5 cents per head must be
paid on all sheep, and 25 cents per pay-
ment of the tax this year on the head
for cattle.

The sheepmen protested against the
grounds that sufficient notice had not
been given, and that the fee charged is
unjust and unreasonable. They also
quoted in connection with their protest
the recent decision of Judge Whitson,
in a Washington court, in which he
held that the interior department or
the department of forestry had no authority
to conduct criminal prosecutions and
impose fines. It seems, however, that
this decision simply affects criminal
prosecutions for trespass.

According to the above telegram the
payment of the fee will be required be-
fore the grazing permits are issued, and
as it is reported that the department is
to maintain a mounted patrol through-
out the reserve during the summer, it

seems very likely that the owners of
sheep, cattle and also horses will be
compelled to pay for the use of the
range.—Pendleton Tribune.

Cost of Obedience a Law.

Chicago, June 7.—The improvements
at the Union Stockyards to be ordered
by the city authorities as the result of
the recent examination of buildings will
cost the packers nearly \$1,000,000 ac-
cording to estimates made by Building
Commissioner Hartzman. It will re-
quire an expenditure of about \$500,000,
maybe \$200,000 more, to make changes
needed to conform with the require-
ments of the city building ordinance,
while the sanitary improvements to be
insisted upon will cost about \$300,000.
The building and sanitary inspectors
are still at work going over the packing
plants.

Salem, Or., June 7.—Governor Cham-
berlain has issued a proclamation se-
lecting June 14 as Flag day and recom-
mending that it be observed by the
schools and the people of Oregon in
commemoration of the day on which
the emblem was selected by the con-
tinental congress in 1777.
