

The Bryan boom for the Democratic nomination for president seems to be sweeping the country. Bryan is the strongest man in the Democratic party to-day but not strong enough to beat Roosevelt.

The packing house investigation will result in some good. The packing houses are frantic in their efforts to clean up. Things will be kept clean for a little while at least. It is too bad that the poor packers who have been hanging on the ragged edge of bankruptcy for so long are now compelled to spend a little of their hard earnings.

The next Oregon legislature will contain six democrats only, all of them in the senate. This will be the smallest democratic representation in many years. Of the 36 members of the state senate 14 are hold-overs. Of the 15 elected this year seven signed statement No. 1 and two pledged themselves to support the republican voters' choice for United States senator. Of the 60 members of the house, 30 signed statement No. 1 and six pledged themselves to vote for the republican voters' choice for the United States senator. In other words, since Burne, a republican, has received the popular vote, there are 54 members of the legislature pledged to his support. It requires only 40 to elect.

Any attempt to defeat the election of Jonathan Burne, jr., in the legislature is almost certain to meet with failure. A principle greater than any man in Oregon is behind Burne and his defeat means his defeat of the principle. Any man who attempts to vote for the people will be regarded with suspicion and his efforts will avail nothing. Even those who dislike Burne will support the desire of the people to elect United States senators and no man in Oregon is big enough to supplant Burne under such conditions. Nor is any one stupid enough to treat him at the game of politics. He is destined to be Oregon's junior senator and nothing can prevent it. In the same way C. W. Fulton will be elected two years hence and so on, we hope, to the end of time voters will be elected in Oregon by the people.—Pendleton Tribune.

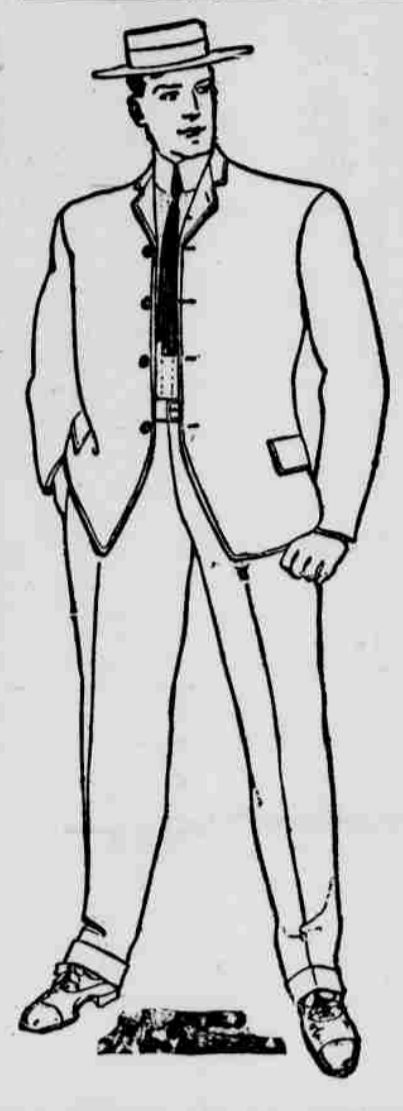
