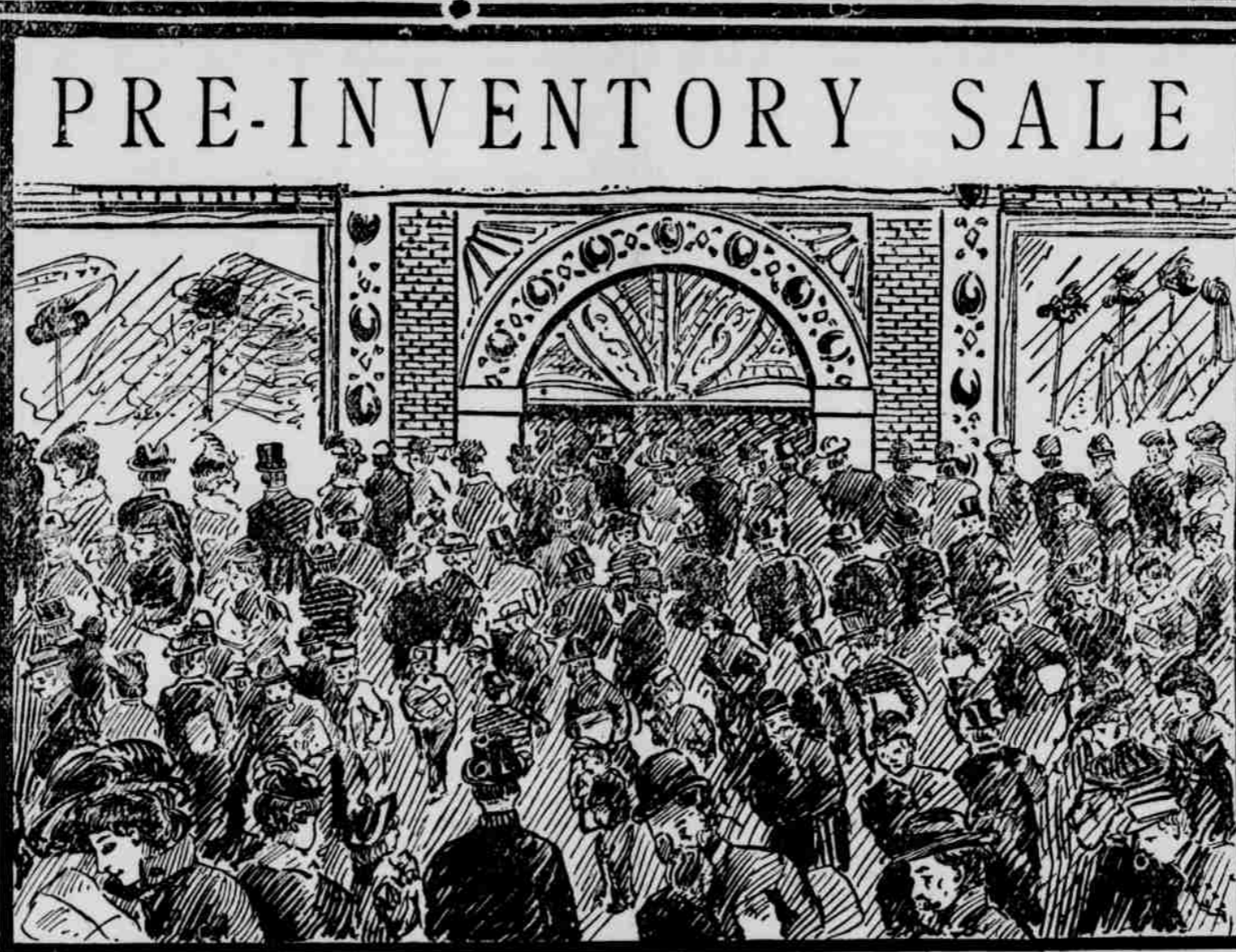
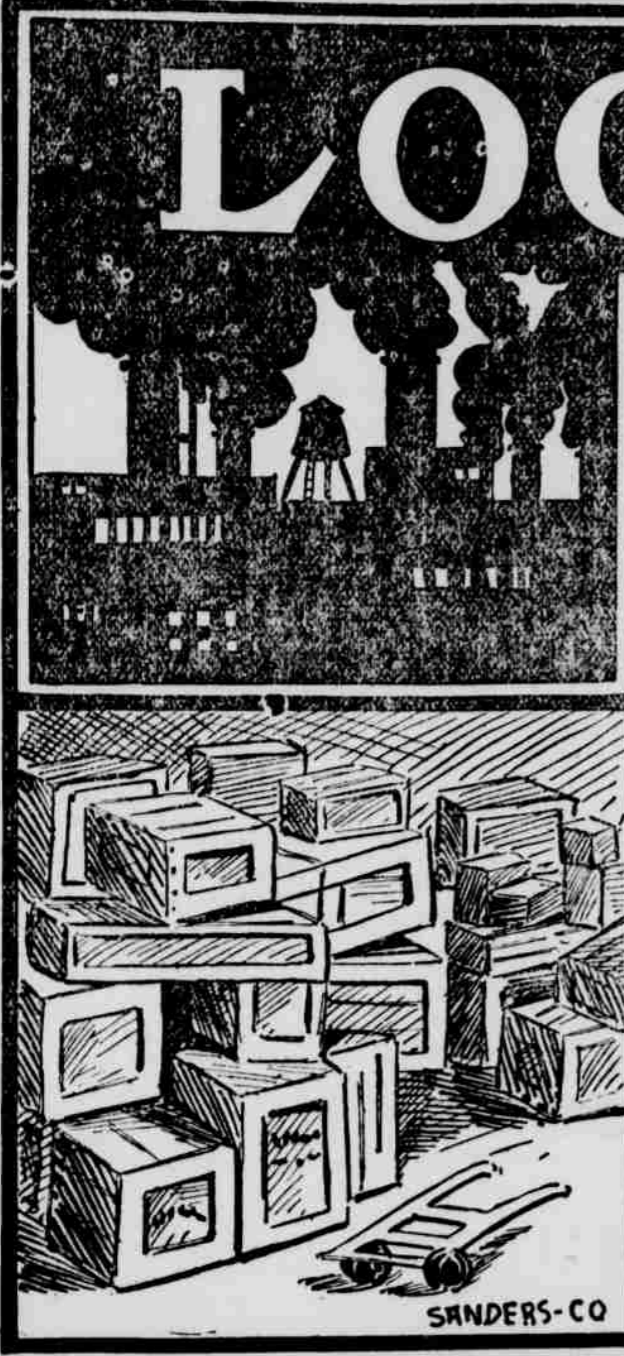

BIG CIRCUS COMING.

Will Exhibit in Heppner Next Tuesday Afternoon And Night.

The Great Burch and Reiss Circus, Educational Museum, Big Double Menagerie, and Aerial Enclave will exhibit in Heppner next Tuesday afternoon and night, under enormous waterproof tents which will be located in the central part of the city. JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION.

Henry Blackman Eastern Oregon Representative.

Salem, Or., June 12.—Governor Chamberlain today appointed Henry Blackman, of Heppner; Jefferson Myers, of Portland; D. H. Jackson, of Jacksonville, and Tom Richardson and A. H. Devers of Portland, as commissioners to arrange for the proper representation of Oregon at the Jamestown Exposition in 1907. The appointments were made in response to a request from the Portland Commercial Club and the Portland Board of Trade. The commissioners are expected to make a report for the information of the Legislature.

The Lewis and Clark Fair Commission has on hand a balance of about \$80,000 in cash and good property that will be turned back to the state. President Jefferson Myers of the Lewis and Clark Commission says that about \$35,000 would make a very creditable exhibit for the State of Oregon at the Jamestown Exposition. The Legislature may be asked to direct the use of a part of the balance from the Lewis and Clark Fair to make an exhibit at Jamestown.

The Oregon Jamestown Exposition commission met and organized, electing Jefferson Myers president.

Mr. Blackman returned from Portland Monday. Being a thorough exposition man he is greatly in hopes that a liberal appropriation will be made in order that the state can be well represented.
