**WORK OF CONGRESS**

(Concluded from first page.)

demeanor. Alaska was given the right to send a Delegate to Congress, and an act was passed whereby that territory will have a large school and public improvement fund. The Secretary of the Interior was also authorized to allot homesteads to the natives of Alaska.

Although the ship-subsidy measure did not become a law, 24 public acts relative to shipping were enacted. The application of the coastwise laws to the Philippines was postponed until 1909. An omnibus bill authorizing the erection of a number of aids to navigation became a law.

Liberality towards the Indian, the ward of the Nation, characterized the several enactments on that subject. The tendency shown was to grant full citizenship to those Indians who show capability for it; to open for settlement certain of the reservations, the proceeds to go to the Indians and in one instance to provide for the distribution of the tribal property to individuals of the tribe.

Ten bills relative to the courts of the United States were passed. The important measure relative to court procedure is that which prescribes the exact procedure which must be followed by witnesses to secure immunity from prosecution later.

President Roosevelt was given \$25,000 to pay traveling expenses of himself and invited guests.

The private pension legislation of the session was heavy and many hundred such acts will be signed before the end comes.

The Jamestown, Va., Centennial is expected to be recognized by law before the session ends.

A bill introduced by Representative Sherman, of New York, was passed and will make it unlawful hereafter to stamp the words "Government assay" on articles manufactured of gold and silver.
