75 Miles of New Line Surveyed On of Baker City on Route to Sound.

A new electric railroad, known as the Oregon & Northern, with the eastern terminus at Baker City, and the western terminus at some point on Puget Sound...

Seventy-five miles of the line have already been surveyed and the party is now camped on Rock Creek, about 10 miles south of Hardman G. W. Winkler...

The line as surveyed goes through a timbered country for a railroad. It goes through the finest body of timber in the Blue mountains, and then tops some of the finest farming land in Eastern Oregon.

Surveys have already been taken at several points on the Columbia, to ascertain the most feasible crossing. This suggests the pass near Mt. Adams as the most probable. This is said to be the most practical pass in the Cascade range and is being very closely scrutinized by several different parties.

It is surmised that eastern capital is back of the scheme, but whether it has any connection with any of the great transcontinental roads is not known.

Why Don't Homeseekers Come To Morrow County?

Morrow county produces more wealth per capita than any other county in the state of Oregon. Our territory within county lines is 75 miles in length by 25 miles in width, large enough for a state, but with not enough population for a good sized country village. Only 5000 people in the county.

Every year we grow about 1,000,000 bushels of wheat. This is worth about \$700,000.

Stamp Acts. Japan has just issued a three sen stamp to commemorate the amalgamation of the Japanese and Korean postal departments. It is printed in carmine, the jubilee and national color.

A well known English philatelist claims that the five shilling stamp of New Zealand is the handsomest stamp in existence. It pictures the famous Mount Cook and is printed in a rich shade of vermilion.

Brazil through its more than sixty years of stamp issuing has managed to get along without using watermarked paper, but very recently three values of the current set appeared on paper containing the letters "Estados Unidos Brazil."

FOR THE CHILDREN A Trick With Cards. Tricks with cards and dominos afford a pleasing entertainment, and one termed "the nailed card" is surprising. It is performed in this way: Take a flat headed nail and file it down until its point is as sharp as a needle and the head is quite flat. The nail should be about half an inch long or even shorter. Pass the nail through the center of any card, say the ace of spades, and conceal it in your left hand. Take another pack of cards, get the ace of spades to the bottom and allow them to be inspected. When the cards are returned shuffle them about and exchange the pierced card for the bottom. Put the pierced card at the bottom of the pack and throw the cards suddenly against a door, when the nail will be driven in by the pressure of the other cards against the head, and the chosen card will be nailed to the door. The nail should be put through the face of the card, so that when the others fall on the floor it remains facing the spectators.
