FARMERS MEET.

Sherman County Wheatgrowers' Association Formed.

Sherman county farmers to the
number of more than 100, attended a
meeting at the town of Wasco on Satur-
day afternoon, for the purpose of organ-
izing a wheatgrowers' association, to co-
operate with the association recently
formed in this county.

The general plan of the Umatilla
county association was followed by the
farmers of Sherman county and it is
certain that excellent results will
follow.

A special from The Dalles to the
Oregon Sunday Journal gives the fol-
lowing account of the meeting:

Unbounded enthusiasm prevailed at
the convention farmers held in this
place for the purpose of discussing an
organization of the Oregon farmers, says
the Journal. It was decided that the
time for the tillers of the soil to band
together for mutual benefit had come and
a meeting will be held at Moro July 21,
when permanent organization will be
effected. "Stand By One Another"
was the watchword of the meeting and
everything was harmonious, not a
single discord being struck throughout
the meeting.

Features of the meeting were able
addresses by President Smith of the
Open River association and Mr. Devers
of Portland. The speakers touched up-
on the matters to be brought before the
association when it is formed and out-
lined a line of campaign for the benefit
of the farmers.

It was determined at today's meeting
to further the project of securing legisla-
tion at the next session of the legisla-
ture for the establishment of a jute mill
at the Oregon state penitentiary.

It was shown that the \$175,000 mill at
the Washington prison at Walla Walla
is turning out 8500 jute sacks daily at a
retail price of 6 1/2 cents each at a profit
to the state. This brings the price of
grain sacks within reason, the farmers
declare, while under existing conditions
they complain they are forced to pay
much higher prices than those which
the ranchers of the sister state are
asked to pay.

After permanent organization is ef-
fected, it is planned by the farmers to
arrange for salesdays, like those of the
woolgrowers' association. At these
salesdays the farmers will pool their
grain and put it up at auction, allowing
the grain dealers to gather and bid up
on the output of the community, thus
creating a fair competition which will
work to the material benefit of the
wheat raiser.

In other things besides the marketing
of their grain, the farmers see the
necessity of acting in harmony, and as
they have learned, so they state, that
the only successful mode of accomplish-
ing their ends is through organization,
they will endeavor at the Moro meeting
to form an association which will be
strong and long lived.

FRAUD IS CLAIMED.

Grant County Locators Held up by Land Office Officials.

Baker City, Or., July 12.—Something
of a sensation if not the genuine article
is promised Baker county in the matter
of timber land locations and possible
frauds. As is well known, several
hundred people have recently come in
here from the east and other points and
have gone into the John Day and
Harney countries and located timber
lands. Many Baker City people have
also located timber lands in the same
territory. Their work may be all for
naught.

A well known Baker City man, man-
ager of a mine near Prairie City, who
has just returned from there, is au-
thority for the statement that much ex-
citement, confusion and fear of loss on
the part of locators has been developed
within the past few days. Coupled
with this, he states that arrests are
threatened on the part of the locators of
trussers who cheated them in their loca-
tions and on the part of the government
of locators who have made misrepresen-
tations in the land office and who are
suspected of selling their location
rights in conspiracy.

The locators claim that it is highway
robbery for the cruisers to charge them
\$100 to \$200 a location and then put
them on the map five miles from the
ground they have to swear they had
seen. But so far as known, there is no
legal way to reach the cruiser.

On the other hand the government
detectives who have been on the ground
watching proceedings and taking notes
claim to have evidence that locators are
selling their rights or had sold them be-
fore they went into the timber. All
locations have been stopped in this
locality, papers withheld and filings de-
clined. An investigation, it is under-
stood, will be made at once and the
while affair shown up. The cruisers
placed many locators in the forest
reserve and these filings were promptly
thrown out. What the outcome will be
is a question and many think a sen-
sation is in store. Possibly Henev will
have another job in Oregon.

Norfolk, Va., July 7.—The value of
free alcohol to the public can be better

combustion engines using denatured
alcohol for fuel. Farmers will learn at
the Jamestown exposition how to save
labor in a thousand different ways.
They will be shown how they can
utilize machinery for sawing wood,
chopping stock feed, pumping water,
and many other things. And the
farmer's wife can employ machinery for
doing her churning, washing, operating
her sewing machine, and in many other
ways to save labor. Special machinery
is already being made for utilizing this
new and cheap fuel, and so economical
will be this fuel alcohol that every
farmer can make his own supply from
the waste products of his farm.

Uncle Sam will also show the public
how to use denatured alcohol as a fuel
for heating and cooking purposes at
home, and for lighting the houses and
country roads. He will teach the
farmers how they may save time and
expense by making their fuel and lights
at so small a cost that their living
expenses will be reduced to a minimum,
and their conveniences so greatly increas-
ed that they will find real luxury in
living on a farm.

SALES DAY FIXED.

Inland Wheat Growers Association Hold Meeting.

At the Commercial rooms the Inland
Wheat Growers' association held its
second meeting, adopted rules and regu-
lations in reference to sales and at-
tended to other business.

The members of the association de-
cided to have the date of sales on the
days that were written in the rules and
regulations if suitable to buyers. If,
however, the buyers do not think the
time appointed the best, it is the inten-
tion of the association to change them
so all parties concerned will be satis-
fied.

Among other things brought up in
the meeting was the warehouse ques-
tion. The farmers believe now that the
charges made by the different com-
panies is much too large and greatly in
excess to the running expenses of the
concerns. Before they act in any
manner, however, they intend to look
on all sides of the question, so have
appointed a committee to thoroughly
probe the matter and report at the next
meeting which will be two weeks from
yesterday.

As there will be more strength in
numbers the action taken by the as-
sociation will be more concerted and re-
solved to greater credit to the farmers
all over the country. All farmers are
urged to join the association. This can
be done by calling at the office of the
secretary, Dan Smythe, or at any of the
members of the association who have
the constitution of the association, pay-
ing to them one dollar and signing their
names to the constitution. Following
are the rules and regulations that were
adopted at the meeting yesterday.

Rule 1. Dates of sales shall be on
Wednesdays of each week, beginning
August 8th and ending September 28th,
at public sales rooms, Pendleton, Ore-
gon, and on Thursdays of each week,
beginning August 9th and continuing
until September 27th, at public sales
rooms at Athena, Oregon.

Rule 2. Hours of sales, 10 a. m. to
11:30 a. m.; 1 p. m. to 4 p. m.

Rule 3. No bids less than one-eighth
cent.

Rule 4. Samples of wheat shall be
listed with the secretary one day prior
to sales day upon which the same shall
be sold, and shall be enclosed in a
quart, self-sealing glass jar, and each
member shall list a fair sample of each
kind of wheat and shall submit there-
with a statement showing the kind,
quality, etc., which statement will be
furnished by the secretary of the In-
land Wheat Growers' association; this
statement is to accompany each sepa-
rate sample of wheat stating the neces-
sary facts contained therein.

Rule 5. Buyers shall have the privi-
lege of submitting samples of any
wheat offered for sale providing it is
filed with the secretary before date of
sale in a quart self-sealing glass jar with
the name of buyer and necessary facts
attached.

Rule 6. Wheat shall be sold on ware-
house receipt weights.

Rule 7. No wheat will be listed with
secretary unless the owner thereof is a
member of the Inland Wheat Growers
association.

Rule 8. Sellers will have all of the
day within which bid is made is made
to accept or reject the same.

Rule 9. No wheat shall be put up for
sale but once on the same sales day.—
Pendleton Tribune.

Weds Victim's Daughter.

Sioux City, Iowa, July 13.—W. P.
Royce, machinist for the Sioux City
Electric Company, has been married to
Loretta Patton Hendricks, daughter of
the woman whom he shot to death ten
years ago while in a jealous rage. The
ceremony was performed at Le Mars,
Iowa, in the Chautauqua tent by Rev.
W. G. Moore.

Royce has thus made a curious repara-
tion to the orphaned girl, who was be-
reft of her mother through his act. He
was but 17 years old when he became
infatuated with the pretty widow,
Nellie Patton. She did not return his
affection, and during a spree he killed
her and was sent to the penitentiary for
17 years.

His mother and sister, who are highly
respected and influential, believed the
boy was reformed, secured his parole
and later his pardon after he had served
three years. He was welcomed back
by his old associates and given a fine
position, having learned mechanical
engineering while in prison.

Loretta had been adopted by a promi-
nent farmer named Hendricks near
here. Royce called on her brother
Andrew, and later on her, with the re-
sult that they are now married.

One Tree Bears Nuts and Fruit.

Albany, Or., July 16.—A tree bearing
23 distinct varieties of fruit and nuts is
growing on the farm of Thomas Glaze,
in Benton county, just across the
Willamette River from Albany. It is
healthy and flourishing.

Mr. Glaze undertook to grow the tree
as an experiment, and by judicious
grafting has succeeded in producing a
marvel. He secured all the kinds of
peaches, plums and prunes that he
could and grafted them onto the trunk
of a healthy, growing apple tree. All

almond branch onto the same tree and
it also is growing.
