MCKINLEY'S NIECE WEDDED.

**Young Woman Renounced Social
Leadership at White House
to Be Schoolmarm.**

Miss Grace McKinley, niece of the
late president, who renounced the pros-
pect of social leadership at the White
House that she might realize her ambi-
tion and teach school, was married
July 18th, at Des Moines, Iowa, to
Captain Grayson Villard Heidt, the
chum of her brother, Captain James
McKinley. It was a military function
and took place at the home of Captain
McKinley.

It was after her debut at the White
House during the administration of her
uncle that Miss McKinley first met
Captain Heidt, but it was not until later
in the picturesque town of Jolo, in the
Philippines, that the romance really
had its beginning. Miss McKinley was
visiting her brother and was thrown
much in the company of his chum.
Captain Heidt had two years to serve in
the islands, but before the president's
niece returned to the United States he
had exacted a promise from her that
she would wait for him.

When Miss McKinley was graduated
from Mt. Holyoke in 1899, President
McKinley, his wife and a large party
from Washington attended the cere-
monies. It was the president's earnest
desire that his favorite niece should
come to Washington and divide social
care and honors with Mrs. McKinley.
The girl spent one winter at the capital
and then, much to her uncle's disap-
pointment, obtained a position as
teacher in a high school.

She is the daughter of James Mc-
Kinley, and was left an orphan when
she was three years old.

HOLY ROLLERIST DEAD.

**Widow of Creffield Says Creed Has
Lost Its Followers.**

Seattle, Wash., July 19.—"I believe
the religion is dead forever" is the de-
claration of Mrs. Maude Creffield,
widow of the dead leader of Holy Rol-
lers, given at the county jail today.
Mrs. Creffield forever asserts that she
and her husband had, at the time his
life was taken by George Mitchell, al-
ready made alterations in their religious
beliefs, and had discontinued the prac-
tices which had rendered their faith
obnoxious to the communities in which
they had been established.

It has been their intention, she states,
to make Seattle their home and to leap
new and totally different lives.

"Our religion is a faith," she said,
"because we believed as we do it is no
cause for saying we are insane. Why
not say all religious are insane? I
don't believe I should discuss Holy
Rollerism at all. This much I will say:
I have changed my belief since the
time my dead husband was leading us
in Oregon. We had both changed and
we believed differently at the time of
his death than before. There are
several things regarding which our be-
lief has changed. I might say that we
eliminated all the things the public
generally condemned and had reorga-
nized our creed.

"We had resolved to make a new
home in Seattle, away from the scenes
that had become obnoxious to us both,
and it was with the intention of estab-
lishing ourselves and getting along in
the world that we were remaining in
Seattle when my husband was killed.

"Yes, it was our intention to continue
in our faith there, but it would have
been a revised faith and one against
which there could not have been a
breath of suspicion. Membership
would have been taken in as our plans
developed and we would have been
happy, for we had determined upon
new lives.

"It would not be right for me to say
what features of our practices were
eliminated after the reunion in Seattle
this spring. When we were doing what
we did in Oregon we thought it right,
and this being the case, and having
changed when we found further light
and viewed our practices as wrong, it is
not for the public to know what the
inner workings of our religion was.

"Holy Rollerism is not spreading and
there is little danger of it doing so. In
fact, it has not been practiced by us for
more than two years. Other than we
two women there are none in Seattle.
The report that four are living in
Everett is untrue, and for that matter,
other than those who have remained
faithful in Oregon there are no Holy
Rollers, and I believe the religion is
dead forever."

Want Columbia Boat.

The Dalles, Or., July 23.—A commit-
tee from the Open River association met
the citizens of The Dalles at the
Commercial club rooms Saturday night
for the purpose of securing support
from The Dalles merchants for a line of
boats to be operated with the state por-
tage road. The committee consisted of
Hon. J. N. Teal, A. H. Devers, S. M.
Meers, E. Newbegin and Traffic
Manager Smith.

Speeches were made outlining the
plan of operation, and an adjournment
had until this afternoon, when a meet-
ing was held with prominent members
of the Business Men's association of
this city.

The Open River association now has
boats on the upper river connecting
with the portage road at Celilo, and it is
the intention to have one or more boats
in Portland to run to The Dalles or Big
Eddy, the terminus of the portage road,
thus having a through line from Port-
land to extreme portions of the inland
empire.

delegates to the National Irrigation con-
gress to be held at Boise City Septem-
ber 3-8, from Umatilla county, the
largest number of delegates selected
from any one county in the state.

by the governor is as follows: A. D.
Stillman, Pendleton, D. C. Brownell,
Umatilla; S. D. Peterson, Milton; W.
M. Peterson, Athena; C. E. Redfield,
Heppner; Zora Snow, Portland; F. N.
Sheffield and C. W. Mallett, Ontario; F.
W. Triplett, Bend; C. W. Nibley and
F. S. Cramwell, La Grande; D. W.
Barnes, Laidlaw; H. F. Jones, Red-
mond; E. M. Brunick, Portland.

He has endeavored to secure dele-
gates who would attend the congress
and take an interest in the proceedings.
Many important and vital questions
will be discussed at the meeting at
Boise and Oregon being deeply interest-
ed in irrigation development, should
take a leading part in the program of
the congress.

Aside from the regular delegates from
Oregon, it is expected that a large num-
ber of visitors will also attend the con-
gress.

THE PASTIME

Moro, July 18.—At the meeting of the
Inland Wheat Growers' Association
here last Sunday, Frank J. Sackett,
traffic manager of the Open River
Transportation Co., guaranteed ware-
houses and scales at Rufus for this
year's business if the farmers would
guarantee wheat, not less than 10,000
sacks, for the boat line and portage
road. Before the meeting ended he had
nearly the requisite number guaranteed
and more farmers to hear from and the
required amount has since been made
up.

The new warehouse will be handled
by responsible grain men and charges
will be as low as possible as 35 cents per
ton.

The farmers aren't hauling to Rufus
as a club altogether for the railroad at
lower rates, but give business to portage
road so its friends can go before the
next congress and show increased busi-
ness for the canal project; thus showing
the advisability of the canal at Celilo
and the need of it for the proper de-
velopment of the region.
