Senator Fulton not Scared.

"That for your threats?"
And United States Senator Charles W. Fulton snaps his fingers defiantly at Secretary Hitchcock, of the Department of the Interior.
According to the Senator, the Secretary can go as far as he likes and he will not disturb the equilibrium of Oregon's only representative at Washington. The Senator is not afraid of the consequences.
That Secretary Hitchcock is angry at the Oregon Senator, is generally known. It came about through Senator Fulton making a criticism of the Secretary regarding the latter's attitude on public improvements affecting this state, in a recent interview in The Evening Tele-

gram. The Senator said that Hitchcock was in his dotage.
Now Secretary Hitchcock has unbottled his wrath against Senator Fulton and wants revenge. What is more, according to report, Hitchcock will be satisfied with nothing less than an indictment against Fulton. It has been freely intimated that Hitchcock is so wrath he has summoned W. J. Burnes, the Government detective, for the express purpose of investigating the record of Senator Fulton, in the hope of unearthing something upon which to lay the foundation for his revenge.
And this is what causes Senator Fulton to smile. The Senator doesn't care. Furthermore, he is quite willing to have Secretary Hitchcock take a microscope and go over his trail.
"There is no occasion for Secretary

Hitchcock to be excited over my remark," declared Senator Fulton. He had just finished his dinner, was smoking a cigar and could look at Hitchcock's threats complacently. "I simply told the truth. He has trouble with all the Western Senators, and there are some who do not enter his office from one year's end to the other."
"I can scarcely believe that the Secretary said he would look into my record in the hope of finding something wrong, although it is quite possible that he would, for he is a man who has a violent temper when he encounters opposition. Insofar as investigating my record, he can do so to his heart's desire. I have nothing to be ashamed of, nor have I done anything of which I should be afraid of punishment.

Fleeing From Quakes.

Albuquerque, N. M., July 19.—Refugees in large numbers are arriving in this city from Socorro, N. M., where great damage has been wrought by daily earthquakes since July 2, during which period not an hour has passed without one or more earthquakes. The center of the disturbance is 30 miles long by about 178 wide, running from the Ladrone Mountains southeast through Socorro, San Antonio and San Marcial. This side the belt the shock have been hardly felt. Each one is preceded by a loud rumbling like heavy thunder, which can be heard approaching from the northwest before it reaches Socorro.

Senor Baca, of Socorro, until recently District Attorney, is in the city with his family. He says people are leaving on every train, and those who cannot ride on the railroad are leaving by wagon. About 2000 persons are camping out in tents, and no one dares to go indoors. Practically every residence and business block in the town has been appreciably damaged. There has been much distress among the people who are camping in the open, as heavy rains have fallen in the last two days, one being the heaviest for 50 years. Most of the people are going to El Paso, although many are coming to Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

The shocks generally occur as short, sharp jerks, the ground seeming to slip violently. It is believed that the adjustment of rock strata in the rugged Ladrone and Magdalena Mountains is the cause of the continued shocks.
Provisions are growing scarce and real distress is feared among the refugees.
"The noise and the quakes are frightful," said Mrs. J. J. Loeson, a refugee from Socorro. "I have experienced

earthquakes in Los Angeles and San Francisco, but never anything so sickening as these prolonged rockings and jerking of the earth at Socorro. Water placed in a bowl will show continuous vibrations between the greater shocks, showing that the earth is never still. Not a house in town is safe to enter, and chimneys and walls topple with each recurring tremor."

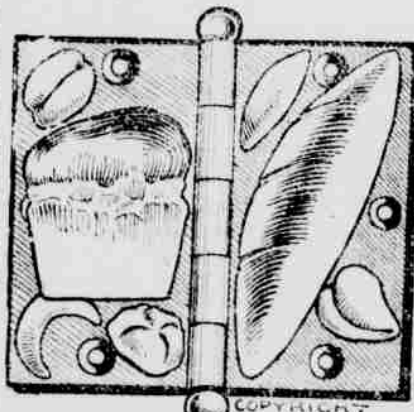
