TAX DECISION CAUSES TROUBLE.

Rolls Will Have to Be Revised in Order to Add Exemptions.

The decision of the supreme court to the effect that the exemption clause of the assessment law is invalid will increase the taxable property in the state by adding the property exempted, to the amount of \$8,700,031.

There will be much complication over the decision since nearly all the tax for the past assessment has been paid and property holders have a receipt in full for their taxes. It is said that unlimited litigation will follow any attempt to collect on property exempted in the last assessment.

The work of the assessors will be greatly increased this year since the assessment rolls are complete and in order to collect taxes on exemptions, the entire roll will have to be revised and exemptions added to the total throughout the list.

JOHN D. DOES NOT WORRY.

Physician Declares He is Paying No Attention to Suit.

Cleveland, July 29.—Neither the proceedings of the Government nor the state authorities against the Standard Oil Company are worrying John D. Rockefeller in the slightest. He is not giving them the least attention. This was the emphatic statement today by Dr. H. F. Biggar, physician to and traveling companion of Mr. Rockefeller. Dr. Biggar left Mr. Rockefeller in New York Saturday, after a six weeks' sojourn with Mr. and Mrs. Rockefeller and party in Northern France. He reached Cleveland today. When he left New York the immediate plans of the Rockefellers had not been settled.

"Mr. Rockefeller and wife will be at Forest Hill this week, I am certain," said Dr. Biggar. "They may come tomorrow, and it may be Wednesday. "If it has been reported that Mr. Rockefeller is disturbed over proceedings against the Standard Oil Company and the bringing in of his name in this connection, quite the contrary is true. "Mr. Rockefeller has been having a few weeks' recreation and rest. He has not been thinking about Standard Oil Company affairs, and why should he when he has not been actively connected with the business for 12 years?"

Asked if Mr. Rockefeller believed that because he had been out of the active life of the great corporation for years this fact would render him immune from any possible legal attack, Dr. Biggar replied: "That is a matter I know nothing about. Mr. Rockefeller has never talked on the subject so far as I know." According to Dr. Biggar, Mr. Rockefeller was never in better health and

spirits than now. "He enjoyed his vacation trip to France immensely," said Dr. Biggar. "He was out of doors most of the time, engaged for the most part in golfing and motoring. The only thing troubling him is the condition of his daughter, who is affected with heart trouble. Her condition was much improved when we left France, but, of course, heart disease is an uncertain thing."

Long Beards.

Sulphur.
Sulphur is a solid, nonmetallic mineral which has been known from earliest ages. It is hard, yellow and brittle and has a most offensive odor. It is found in veins or beds, mostly near active volcanoes. The imported sulphur mostly comes from Solfatara, in Sicily, but large quantities are also produced from copper and iron pyrites. These minerals are heated, and the sulphur being volatile flies off in fumes, which are conveyed by means of pipes to a condensing room. If left in the powdery state in which it condenses it is called flour of sulphur. If melted and cast into bars it is called roll sulphur.

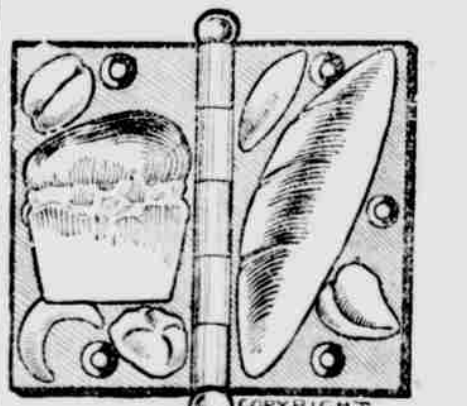
