The main object of the meeting is to discuss the needed legislation desired at the next session of the legislature for the protection of the Oregon sheepmen from across the line in Washington that have been monopolizing range that the Oregon men claim they have no right to.

There certainly is a good joke on C. A. Minor, the genial manager of the Penland Land and Livestock company. Mr. Minor is a true sportsman and to be sure that he was right on the game laws secured a copy of the laws which he carried with him for ready reference. But the trouble was he got a copy of the law passed prior to the last session of the legislature when it was lawful to shoot grouse on the 1st of August. Unfortunately for Mr. Minor this law was changed at the last session of the legislature extending the closed season to the 15th of August. He shot a couple of grouse and going up the road with the birds on exhibition he was confronted by Game Warden Heath, and to make a long story short he was fined.

Unless there should very speedily be a sharp advance in the prices of wool in Montana markets, sheep men state that much of the wool in the State will not be sold within the next few weeks. They are convinced that the buyers have effected a "gentlemen's agreement" as they did in Idaho, where it remained effective until after a special meeting of the woolgrowers' state association, and that buyers will not pay for the wool of Montana the prices justified by the quality of the clips and the strong positions of the Boston and other markets. Many growers are preparing to hold their wool. Growers at Fort Benton have already made arrangements to store 1,000,000 pounds in a warehouse there, and have been assured by bankers that loans will be made on the wool in such warehouses at low rates of interest and at valuations equal to the prices that have thus far been paid in Montana markets.—American Wool and Cotton Reporter.

CITY COUNCIL.

New Marshal Appointed -- Ordinances Read.

The city council met in regular session Monday evening. Councilmen Minor, Garrigus and Warnock answered to roll call with Mayor Gilman in the chair.

F. Roberts and C. F. McCarter were granted a licence to retail liquors.

Ordinance No. 110 regulating saloon licenses was read first time. This is a new ordinance and was copied in the main from the city law of Pendleton covering licenses. The ordinance provides that after January 1, 1907, applications for licenses must be filed at least 15 days before the meeting of the council. A bond of \$1,000 must accompany the application to guarantee proper conduct while the applicant must furnish reference as to good character.

Ordinance No. 111, licensing public skating rinks was read first time.

The office of city marshal was declared vacant and D. C. Gurdane was appointed to fill the vacancy.

The marshal was instructed to open up an alley back of the commercial club building.

The marshal was ordered to arrange a suitable place for the impounding of stock.

Death of Martin Anderson.

Martin Anderson died at his residence in this city last Friday morning. Mr. Anderson had been failing for a number of years through old age which was the cause of his death.

Martin Anderson was a familiar figure on the streets of Heppner. He was one of Morrow county's earliest pioneers and was well known.

Mr. Anderson was a man of varied experiences and eccentric character. His education was good and he had traveled extensively, having mined in Australia and South Africa in an early day.

His active life in Morrow county was devoted principally to sheep herding until his retirement a few years ago.

He leaves no known relatives. He was buried in the Heppner cemetery Saturday having left an estate ample to pay all funeral expenses.

UNDER ARREST.

Henry Cannon Charged With Horse Stealing.

A great deal of surprise was manifested in this city during the week when it became known that warrants were out for the arrest of H. Cannon and B. Hunter on the charge of horse stealing.

Cannon was arrested at La Grande yesterday and taken to Baker City last night and from there will probably be taken to Ontario.

Hunter has not yet been apprehended but will be captured soon as it is believed all avenues of escape are shot off.

For daring in this particular line this pair have no equals in the land of rustlers. One of the horses was taken into Baker City and sold to Ex-Sheriff Brown while several others were sold in that vicinity.

How many horses they have taken is a hard matter to guess at but it is believed by their arrest the mystery of the disappearance of many horses in this section will be solved.

J. S. Edwards the well known cattle and horse man of Willow creek swore to the complaint charging Cannon with larceny.—Huntington Herald.

E. M. Shutt, sheriff of Morrow county, will no doubt swoon away when he hears of this arrest, as he has been after Cannon's scalp for several years. Cannon has operated in Eastern Oregon for a number of years, being raised in Morrow County, and has always been considered the slickest of the slick among stock rustlers. He had several friends, who have gone on ahead, at Salem awaiting his timely arrival, that have assisted in turning numerous tricks in Morrow and Grant counties.—Harney County News.
