CROP FORECAST OF O. R. & N.

**Company Reports Good Yield, Al-
though Below Average.**

Indications for the wheat yield of the
territory contiguous to the O. R. & N.
lines are that it will be slightly below
the average crop. However, there
seems to be little foundation for so dis-
couraging reports as have been widely
circulated and taken in all the crop
prospects are very good. The reports
about the poor yield of the staff of life
have been exaggerated and the grain
men are taking a very hopeful view of
conditions, according to forecasts which
have been prepared by the Hariman
lines.

There will be enough wheat harvested
to prevent Portland from being dis-
placed as the greatest shipping port in
the United States and the prosperity of
the Eastern Oregon and Eastern Wash-
ington farmers will be continued. Of
course there will not be as much wheat
harvested as in some years, but it will
not be greatly below the average yield.

R. B. Miller, general freight agent of
the O. R. & N. lines, receives daily tele-
graphic reports relative to the condition
of the wheat in all parts of the territory
served by the road which he represents.
These reports are made as accurate as
possible because the transportation
company depends upon them in its
plans to move the crop.

Mr. Miller has received word that
there will be about an average crop in
the great Palouse district. As this is
one of the largest of the wheat-produc-
ing sections of the Northwest the yield
there will do much to offset the losses in
other sections of the grain belt. The
crop in the Palouse country is not ex-
pected to fall below that of last year.
There will be a decrease in some sec-
tions of that productive district but in
other places there will be a large in-
crease which leads experts to believe
the yield this year will be about as
large as last year. Indications of the
yield in other parts of the Northwest,
taken from the reports received by Mr.
Miller, are as follows:

In the Grand Ronde Valley there will
be about a 25 per cent increase over the
average crop. This is the only ma-
terial increase noted in any one section
of the wheat belt.

In Umatilla County the yield will be
about the same as last year.

Along the Condon branch of the O. R.
& N. in the vicinity of Shuttlers, Rock
Creek and Mikkelo the yield will be
about 25 per cent. At Clem, Gwendolin
and Condon there will be an increase
of 75 per cent, 10 per cent and 100 per
cent respectively, due largely to increased
acreage.

Along the Heppner branch there will
be a shortage of about 65 per cent.

The yield in Walla Walla county will
fall short by about 10 per cent.

Around The Dalles the quality will be
poor and the yield will be from 20 to 25
per cent short.

Along the Columbia Southern there
will be a decrease of about 50 per cent.

In the Snake River country the yield
will be about the same as last year.
There will be a slight decrease in Whit-
man county and Garfield county, but
this will be offset by the decided in-
crease in Asotin county.

Above estimates are based upon the
conditions as they now appear but they
may be changed somewhat by later de-
velopments. Harvesting will begin in
about ten days in certain localities,
but not in all sections.

The largest wool clip ever
grown on the American continent
was shipped from Billings, Mont.,
over the Burlington to Boston.
The clip was the property of C. M.
Blair and weighed 1,500,000
pounds and 44 cars were required
to carry it. It took a large force
10 days to bale it. The owner re-
fused an offer of 24 cents a pound
for it, and will take his chances in
the Boston market.

U. S. BONDS GOOD.

**Are Eagerly Bought Bearing
Lowest Interest.**

Washington, Aug. 9.—On August 1
the secretary of the treasury issued
\$30,000,000 of 2 per cent bonds to
provide funds for the construction of
the Panama canal. Although these
bonds bear interest at the low rate of 2
per cent, they were sold at a premium
that averaged about \$4 on the hundred,
the lowest successful bid being at the
rate of 103.867. The eagerness to buy a
2 per cent bond is evidenced by the fact
that bids were received for an amount
aggregating \$446,000,000. No other
government in the world can borrow
money at so low a rate. But there is a
reason for the high price of United
States bonds and that is found in the
demand for them on the part of National
banks. Every National bank before its
doors are opened for business must
deposit with the treasurer of the
United States government bonds to a
par value equal to one-fourth of the
bank's capital stock, except that banks
with a capital over \$200,000 are not re-
quired to deposit more than \$50,000 in
bonds. There being 6132 National
banks now in existence the bonds de-
posited amount to \$520,768,000. The
banks have the privilege of issuing if
they so desire an amount of circulating
notes equivalent to the par value of the
bonds so deposited with the treasurer,
but, whether they issue notes or not,
the deposit of bonds is required.

In order to create a demand for the 2
per cent bond congress stipulated when
such bonds were first issued in 1900 that
banks using this class of bond would
pay a tax on circulating notes at one
half the rate charged if other bonds
were deposited and as a result National
banks own \$555,000,000 of the \$625,000,
000 of 2 per cent bonds.

In addition to the \$520,000,000 of
bonds held by the treasurer to secure
the banks' circulating notes he holds
over \$88,000,000 of the banks' bonds as
security for government funds on de-
posit with the banks.

The law authorizing the issue of the
canal bonds stipulated that they should
be in denomination of \$20 and multiples
of that sum, the evident purpose being
to popularize the loan. Each owner of
a single registered bond of \$20 will re-
ceive at the end of every quarter an
interest check for 10 cents. For bond
No. 1 of this denomination \$25 was paid
by a man who stated that he wanted to
hand the bond down as an heirloom to
a new-born grandson, and when the
bond was sent there went with it a
letter of commendation from Secretary
Shaw.

This \$30,000,000 is the first instal-
ment of the \$130,000,000 which congress
authorized the secretary of the treasury
to borrow for the building of the canal
and other issues will follow as funds are
needed.

The senate end of the capitol cannot
be left far behind and on the last day
of July at noon the corner stone was laid
for the senators' office building. On the
similar occasion April 14, when the
corner stone of the house of representa-
tives' addition to the capitol was put in
place the president of the United States
was in attendance together with sena-
tors, representatives and the entire
Masonic order of the District of Colum-
bia and there was much speed-making
and ceremony. In contrast the corner
stone laying of the senate office building
was simplicity itself. Besides the
senators and the newspaper men there
were not a dozen other people present
to witness the raising of the timber
which contained some fifty articles sup-
posedly of interest to some future an-
tiquarian.

The immigration figures for the fiscal
year ended June 30, 1906, show that
35,915 aliens arrived at New York
during that period, an increase of over

SHEEP SHIPMENT.

**Nevada Sheep Will Be Shipped Into
The East.**

Cars by the score are being shipped
by the Oregon Short Line and Rio
Grande to shipping points in Idaho and
Wyoming, thus beginning the sheep
shipping season of the present year.
Shippers give reports of exceptionally
large consignments to be sent this fall,
and it is believed that a new record will
be established, says the Salt Lake Re-
publican.

One of the new features is the fact
sheep from western Nevada are being
sent east this fall instead of to San
Francisco. It is expected that hundreds
of carloads will be shipped from points
in Nevada and eastern California—ship-
ments that have always been sent to the
coast in years past. The change in
traffic will mean much to the western
roads, as this trade was entirely lost in
former years. The destruction of San
Francisco stockyards is, of course re-
sponsible for the alteration. Flock-
masters in the Reno and Truckee
regions have already sent orders here
for cars to be used in shipping their
flocks to the yards in the east.

The new feeding regulations enacted,
which will be followed this year are be-
lieved to be greatly beneficial to both
the railroads and sheepmen. Instead
of the old 28 hour law, shippers have
been sent circulars by the railroad
companies which, when signed and re-
turned, call for 36 hours in the cars
without rest, feeding or water.

The shipments can be made much
easier under the new rule than in
former years and will work to the ad-
vantage of both parties concerned. The
circulars, however, must be signed by
the shippers before the sheep can be
held in the cars for 36 consecutive
hours, and under no consideration are
the railroad companies given the privi-
lege of keeping the animals in the cars
longer than this time. Practically all
of the shippers will avail themselves
of this opportunity to get the sheep to
the market as soon as possible, and the rail-
road companies have already received
many of the return slips.

All though Idaho shipments will be-
gin in a short time. On the Wood
River branch, where many Salt Lake
have flocks, shipments will begin soon,
and before the season has closed, more
than 1200 cars will be loaded with sheep
for the east. At Spencer, Idaho, the J.
D. Wood Livestock company will begin
making shipments September 1, and
will send out 30 carloads weekly until
the shipments are cleaned up. On all
ranches, however, shipments of lambs
will be later than usual on account of
the backward season.
