Portland's population is now estimated at 178,705, an increase of 17,500 during the past year, and the Rose City is just entering upon her most prosperous era of growth and advancement.

There seems to be unusual interest in the next meeting of the Oregon State fair. The state board is working hard to make the fair a success. The whole state should be represented with creditable exhibits.

Now that actual work has been commenced on the Umatilla irrigation project will mean much to Umatilla county and especially the town of Echo. There will flow with the water a rapid increase of wealth and population.

The Proclaimer says that Ione will ship as much wheat this year as last season. This sounds good for an off year. While the yield was cut down greatly by the hot weather of July, Morrow county will still have a large amount of wheat to sell.

The manufacturing industries of the United States during the past year have shown the greatest growth of any year in the history of the country according to a census bulletin just issued by the government. The investment of capital shows an increase of 41 per cent since the last census of 1900.

Portland is endeavoring to build a 20-foot highway from the city to Mount Hood. Such a grand scenic highway would be a great attraction to tourists. The cost is estimated at \$50,000. Such a scheme in Seattle would be only about 15 minutes work. It will take Portland longer.

The migratory sheep law which was passed in 1905 and which has been in the courts almost ever since has been held to be null and void by a recent decision of the supreme court. The court rules that the act is strictly a revenue measure and that the tax is not uniform or levied according to the value.

Great interest is being manifested by the people of the Northwest over the National Irrigation Convention to be held in Boise, Idaho, early in September. Boise will be crowded with the hundreds of visitors that will be present. Oregon is especially interested in the results of this meeting. Oregon should be well represented.

MORE "DRY FARMING."

It is our opinion that the newspapers of the whole Inland Empire ought to keep pounding away at the subject of dry farming.

With scientific farming goes a diversity of crops, carrying with it diversified industries, such as the raising of cattle, sheep, horses, hogs and poultry. The keeping of a few stands of bees and the constant improvement of the home and its surroundings for it is a well known fact that as the farmer studies and plans more intelligently his ideals are raised and his standard of living is likewise elevated.

As we have said before, and as we expect to say a few hundreds of times again, in substance, what we want is smaller tracts and more cultivation. We want our farmers to emulate the better ones. We want them to get out of the old rut. We want them to look upon their business as something permanent, and not as a mere makeshift until they can sell out and "move on." Tillers of the soil who are living with that expectation as a rule are defeated in

all of their aims, for they are so intent on "fitting" that they neglect their business, allow their places to run down, and finally become the worst of all knuckers. The busy man is in nine cases out of ten a prosperous man. He does things. He looks after his surroundings, and makes his home as attractive as he can. And when buyers come into the country their places are sought after and command far higher prices than those of the less progressive ones.—The Dalles Optimist.

The established rule and methods of the Standard Oil company are again being felt in the attempt to acquire the ownership of all the principal distilling plants in the United States. Rockefeller's plan has always been to control or destroy. The fact that denatured alcohol will be a dangerous competitor of the Standard Oil company is the cause of the reaching out for control of the principal source of supply of this product.

Governor Chamberlain has ordered Secretary of State Dunbar to demand from every railroad company in the state reports showing the exact condition of the road, the business transacted, its financial and physical condition. Should the companies refuse to comply, steps will be taken by the executive to enforce the penalties provided, which are fines from \$5,000 to \$10,000 for each offense and imprisonment from two to five years for officials who falsify reports. The governor acts under an old law, which has been considered a dead letter, but which he is convinced is still in force. This can be regarded as the first step in Oregon in the battle for railroad rate regulation, which is now raging with such intensity throughout the nation.—Oregon Journal.

Every insurance commissioner in the country should follow the example of Commissioner Davis, of Nevada: Mr. Davis recently received a letter from the manager of the London & Lancashire requesting information as to the conduct of its business in Nevada. Commissioner Davis replied to the company as follows: "You are generally charged with conducting a 'welching' business. You certainly cannot expect to do business on these lines in California and continue to write policies in this state. I have ordered all policies carried by your company on state property cancelled, and will give you two weeks to begin settling dollar for dollar in San Francisco, and if there is still complaint of your business methods in San Francisco your license to do business in the state will be revoked."
