BARN AND HAY DESTROYED BY FIRE

FIRE STARTED BY THE EXPO-
SION OF A LANTERN.

It Was Only by Hard Work That
the Horses Were Saved.
Loss \$3,000.

A big hay barn and stock shed be-
longing to the Penland Land & Live-
stock company, on what is known as
the Hamilton place, 25 miles southwest
of Heppner, was destroyed by fire
yesterday evening.

The fire started from the explosion of
a lantern. One of the employees of the
company went out in the evening to
feed his team and while carrying a
lantern, fell down which caused the ex-
plosion.

The burning oil soon spread to the
dry hay and there was no chance to
stop the fire.

At the time of the fire, the barn con-
tained a number of work horses. The
horses were saved, but the men did not
have time to get out the harness.

One hundred tons of wheat hay was
burned. The loss is about \$3,000.

Later—C. A. Minor, manager of the
Penland Land & Livestock company
who has just returned from the scene of
the fire states that the barn that was
burned was a new structure having just
been finished. Besides containing about
120 tons of choice wheat hay that had
been bound in bundles, there was a new
twine binder, two seeders, new buggy,
about \$500 worth of harness, several
saddles, besides the bedding for a
threshing crew.

Fortunately there were about 15 men
at the place at the time of the fire, and
all made a run for the horses. They
hardly had time to get the horses out.

DAM IN JOHN DAY.

W. B. Potter is Working on Modern
Structure.

Deputy Game Warden L. S. Fritz, of
The Dalles, was in the city the latter
part of last week, having returned from
Spray where he had been to superintend
the construction of a fish way at the big
dam in John Day, which is being built
by W. B. Potter. In the April freshet a
part of the dam was washed away in-
cluding the fish way. The Carl system
of fish ways which has been approved
by the United States fish commission
is the style to be used at the Potter
dam. The fish way which will be forty
feet in length, will add considerably to
the expense of building the dam. At
Hood River, the Oregon Lumber Co.
was forced to put in a fish way 280
feet long, and after furnishing their own
lumber the cost was \$1000. Mr. Fritz
spoke very highly of the Potter dam
project at Spray. When finished this
dam will be 280 feet long with an average
height of 14 feet. At present about 700
acres of land can be irrigated, while the
dam will furnish a water supply for a
much larger body of land.

Livestock and Wool Notes.

Howard Tobey of Condon has
purchased 2000 head of yearling
wethers and aged ewes from
Lawrence Sweek and J. L. Barn-
house respectively. He paid \$3.25
per head for the wethers.
Howard runs sheep through the
winter nowadays and sells them in
the spring, and makes it pay—
Fossil Journal.

Dillard French, a cattle buyer
on the Butter Creek country, was
in Ritter last week looking for
feeders. Mr. French is offering
\$25 for 2-year-old feeders, the best
price so far this year. From Rit-
ter he went to Prairie City and
the Lee country. Stock
raisers are confident that cattle
will bring very good prices in the
near future.—Monument Enter-
prise.

A letter from George Hardie,
from Trailfork, informs us that the
Argentine sheep mentioned in the
papers as shearing four pounds of
wool were lambs that were born in
September, 1905, and were sheared
in March, 1906. George says the
sheep in Argentine shear a larger
fleece of wool than the same would
do here. They have no winter
there, and no wild animals to con-
tend with. The price of sheep
when Mr. Hardie left there two
months ago was about \$2.40 for
average stock sheep, and mutton
sheep about \$3.50; wool, 10 to 20
cents a pound. No herding to
speak of done. Wages paid the
hands to watch the sheep are from
\$8.80 to \$13.25 a month. Shearers
get 3 1/4 cents per head and do an
extra good job.—Fossil Journal.

Of the 1906 crop of wool there have
been already baled in Pendleton 5,000-
000 pounds, or 133 carloads, estimating
75 bales of an average weight of 500
pounds, to the average car.

According to a special dispatch, B. L-
ings has shipped eleven million pounds
of wool this year, beating last season's
record by nearly a million pounds.
The price for fleeces has not been quite
as good as was expected, for a year ago
there were many clips disposed of at 25
cents per pound, and with the continua-
tion of prosperous times in the nation,
higher prices were expected this sum-
mer. The report comes from Billings
that the best figures obtained for any
clip this year was 24 1/2 cents a pound,
but the average price was probably
from two to four cents lower than the
record figures.—American Wool and
Cotton Reporter.

J. P. Dufour, a wool buyer, who is
representing the firm of Henri Wattine,
of Roubaix, France, purchased one
million pounds of wool at Billings for
his firm, who buy on commission, and
in this case are buying for Lepoutre &
Co., a French manufacturing firm, who
use about eight million pounds of wool
annually.

MAYFLOWER GROUP NOW ACTIVE

SEASON HAS BEEN BUSY ONE IN
DEVELOPMENT WORK.

Stamp Mill Founding Away--Re-
sult of First Clean up Will
Soon be Known.

Judge T. W. Ayers who has returned
from the May flower group of mines in
the Greenhorn district, is highly pleased
over the prospects and frankly admits
that everything is looking much better
than he had any idea of finding.

These mines are owned by Heppner
people, Dan Stalter being the president
and largest stockholder of the company.
Judge Ayers is the owner of a good
block of stock while many other people
in Heppner are directly interested in the
outcome of the mines.

Mr. Stalter who has been superintend-
ing development work has been very
active and has accomplished much
more work than Mr. Ayers expected to
find.

The mining plant now has the ad-
vantage of good water power, about
two miles of ditch having been con-
structed for the conveyance of the
water.

A good saw mill has been put in
already. Mr. Stalter has sawed out
about 60,000 feet of lumber which was
needed in installing the plant.

The stamp mill was put up according
to the plans of Architect Ludlow.
Everything necessary for the operation
of the plant is now ready for operation,
being complete in every detail.

Mr. Stalter will make a ten days run
with the mill when a clean up will be
made and a report will be submitted to
the stockholders.

Unofficial figures estimating the wool
clip of the last season are approximate-
ly as follows: Idaho, 18,000,000
pounds; Utah, 10,000,000; points on
Union Pacific in Wyoming, 6,000,000.
As was natural, on account of the
geographical location of the shearing
pens, the Oregon Short Line received a
large bulk of the tonnage. The rail-
roads strictly maintained the tariff this
year. There were no reductions, and it
is estimated that the wool buyers paid
in the neighborhood of \$700,000 for
freight.
