Metcalfe, who was charged with adultery, the Blue Mountain Eagle says: Detective Frank Snow, of Portland, states that the criminal charge is the result of a suit brought against Mr. Metcalfe by a life insurance company, and that Metcalfe's wife, from whom he had been separated for seven years, came to Portland from eastern Washington and swore out the warrant for his arrest.

There is a mistaken idea widely prevalent in this part of the country, that people can lawfully cut timber for their own use on government land. While this has been the custom for many years, it is not the law, and the government is determined to punish all offenders in this regard to the full extent of the law. Wood cutters must either own their own timber or buy it from those who own it. Strict attention to this will save trouble.—Fossil Journal.

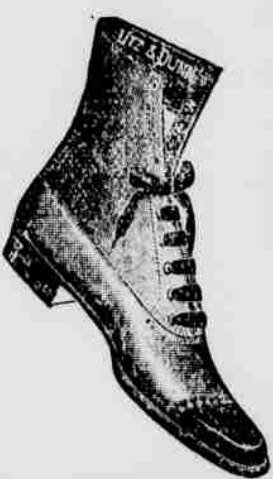
