Miss Frances Liston who has been visiting Miss Rena Meadows, has returned to her home in Salem.

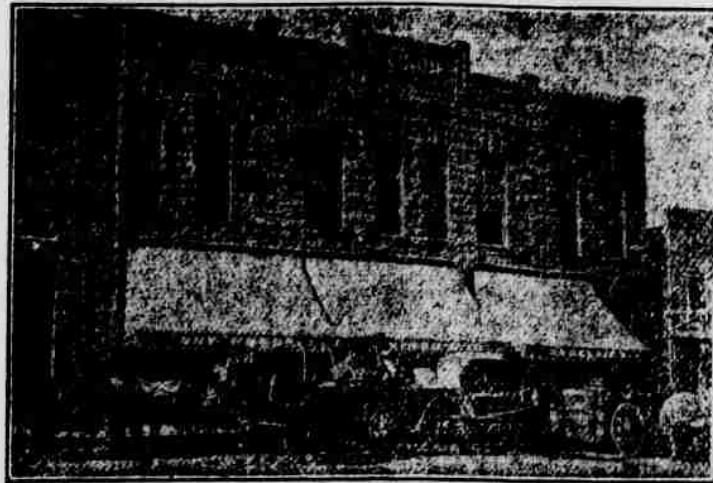
Dave Herren, the Spray merchant who has been in the city for several days returned to Spray yesterday.

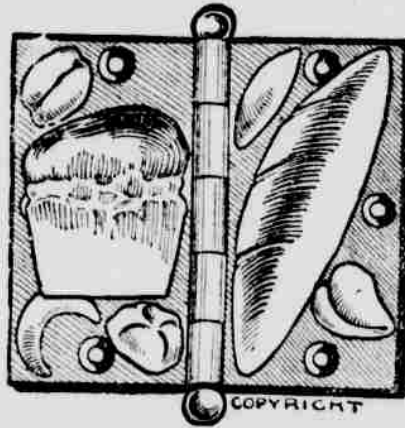
