## WILL INCREASE WATER SUPPLY.

Ditch Creek Will be Turned Into Willow Creek by Means of Ditch.

J. J. McGee, the surveyor, returned from Ditch creek, yesterday where he has been surveying a ditch to divert the waters of Ditch creek to Willow creek.

The scheme has been taken up by the Morrow Ware house Milling Co., and the plan is to cut a big ditch from Ditch creek across the Ditch creek flat to the Willow creek basin. While Ditch creek is only a small stream, still it will add some to the volume of water in Willow creek and will not only help to increase the water power of the Heppner flouring mill, but will also help out the people who irrigate along Willow creek.

The mill company is also considering the proposition of putting in a pipe from the flume ditch which will furnish water for irrigating the lower portion of Heppner.

The question of taking the waters of Ditch creek has been talked of for years.

It is estimated that the cost of digging the ditch will be only about \$200.

Oregon is burdened by a system of excessive distributive freight tariffs which is probably without a parallel in the union. In an article published in The Journal an exposition was made of the extraordinary profits of the railroads operating in this state and of the manner in which their books have been juggled so as to hide these profits from the public gaze. The sources of these profits is found chiefly in the extortionate freight rates. There are few sections of Oregon which enjoy competition in transportation. A comparison of the rates to competitive points affords a striking illustration of the manner in which the great majority of the people of the state are burdened. Such a comparison reveals the fact that wherever it has been possible to do so the railroads have wrong from shippers at non-competitive points rates two and three times as high as charged for similar hauls made in competition with other carriers.—Journal

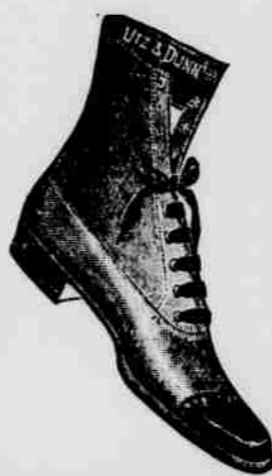
