Will Enforce Law.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 7.—Nothing short of the placing on all meat products of labels which do not deceive the public was the ultimatum delivered by Secretary Wilson to 40 representatives of the packing houses today.

Hereafter if the packers want their goods accepted for interstate commerce shipment the package must bear a label specifically stating what the package contains. It will not do for instance, merely to state that the package contains sausage. The label must distinctly say "pork" or "pork and beef," sausage or any other ingredients. The elimination of advertising all features on the labels will also be insisted upon.

Wilson said in administering the law he would apply common sense and it was not his intention to be hysterical or to impose any unnecessary hardships on the packers.

Adulterating Alfalfa Seed.

Washington, Sept. 6.—The agricultural department has obtained and tested alfalfa seed from various dealers and today published a list of firms sending out adulterated product.

Three hundred fifty-two samples were examined, of which 160 were found to contain seed of the destructive parasitic plant dodder; nine were adulterated with the seed of the yellow trefoil; nine with bar clover.

UMATILLA WOOLGROWERS.

Large Delegation Will Attend Condon Meeting.

At the meeting of the Umatilla County Woolgrowers' association held here Saturday a movement was started for the purpose of securing needed quarantine legislation from the coming session of the legislature. Two things are greatly desired by the local sheepmen—the removal of the federal quarantine, and a law which will have the effect of keeping Oregon ranges for Oregon sheep. In order to bring these subjects before the state convention which will be held at Condon next week, a committee of five was appointed as follows: Dan P. Smythe, Douglas Belts, J. N. Burgess, William Slusher and C. M. Matthews.

Aside from the action regarding quarantine laws the most important action taken Saturday was the naming of delegates to the state woolgrowers' convention which meets next week. Under the rules of the state association each county is allowed one delegate for each 10,000 sheep within the county, thus making Umatilla entitled to 25 representatives.—East Oregonian.

Grounds for Big Damage.

Biose, Idaho, Sept. 10.—Steve Adams, he d in the penitentiary since February 20 last, gained temporary liberty today through habeas corpus proceedings in the district court.

Adams tells a sensational story. He was arrested on his uncle's ranch in Oregon charged with complicity in the assassination of Stunenberg, brought to the Idaho penitentiary and held without a preliminary examination or indictment till March 10. Pinkerton Detective Thiele went to Adams' home without a warrant and brought his wife and two children, aged 7 years and 10 months, to the penitentiary, where they have since been confined in the female ward, no legal proceedings being had. The wife's letters were also opened by the officials.

Attorneys for the prosecution claim Adams has been staying in the penitentiary at his own request, fearing violence. This statement is refuted by Adams, who says he was never permitted to consult relatives or lawyers except one whose fees were paid by the state.

It is predicted large damage suits will be brought.

Dan Patch Lowers Record.

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 8.—Dan Patch demonstrated his right to the title "King of Pacers," at the state fair grounds here this afternoon by breaking the previous world's record held by himself, clipping a quarter of a second off the record established last season at Lexington.

The mile was made in 1:55 flat with a runner in front and a dust shield and another runner at his hip. For this reason doubt is expressed as to whether or not the record will be allowed by the trotting association.


