SUFFERED WITH BROKEN LEG.

**W. F. McNutt in Mountains Three
Days Without Help With
Bad Fracture.**
W. F. McNutt, an old soldier,
and a man 60 years of age suffered
a terrible experience in the Blue
mountains from Friday morning
until Sunday evening.
Mr. McNutt went to the moun-
tains to get a load of wood.
After getting on his load he start-
ed out Friday morning and after
coming about three miles his
wagon struck a stump and was
turned over. The horses broke
away from the wagon and ran
leaving the unfortunate man under
the load of wood. After a great
effort he succeeded in getting out
from under the wood with a badly
fractured leg and a crushed foot.
Crawling to a clump of brush
he cut some sticks and taking a
blanket he cut strings and bound
his leg as good as possible. Tak-
ing his ax he made a pair of
crutches and succeeded in going
about three quarters of a mile
down the road in search of help.
In almost a helpless condition and
with a limited food supply, suffer-
ing with great pain Mr. McNutt
was compelled to endure his tor-
tures until Sunday evening.
The way in which he was found
was a fortunate occurrence. A
camp tender was coming down the
mountain on horseback and was
driving a pack horse. The pack
horse from some cause ran away
from the camp tender and taking to
a sideroad ran out to where Mr.
McNutt was before the camp tender
could turn the horse back. Had
it not been for the pack horse
running away Mr. McNutt would
have missed the camp tender.
The camp tender brought the
news to town and Mr. McNutt was
brought in Sunday evening. He
is now slowly recovering after
having passed through such a
terrible experience.

SPECIAL TRAIN TO PENDLETON.

Monday, September 24—Return un-
til October 1.
On Monday, September 24, the first
day of the district fair, and the occasion
that has been set aside as Morrow
County day, a special train will be run
to Pendleton from Heppner and a one-
way fare will be charged for the round
trip. Those who come to the city on
board the special may then return on a
regular train any time before October 1.
News to the above effect was wired to
Agent E. C. Smith this forenoon by
William McMurray, general passenger
agent of the O. R. & N. company. The
special train and the reduced fare was
granted at the solicitation of the fair
management.
By having the special run over from
Heppner on the forenoon of Morrow
County day, the people of that county
will have an excellent opportunity to
visit the fair, and it is believed a large
delegation will come. Everything pos-
sible is being done by the fair manage-
ment to make the opening day a suc-
cess.—East Oregonian.

SAYS RANGES ARE CROWDED

**Supervisor Sheller Will Advise Cut-
ting Range Privileges 50
Per Cent.**
"My recommendation to the depart-
ment will be to cut the range privilege
for sheep and cattle in this portion of
the Blue Mountain reserve to fifty per
cent of what it has been this season,
for the next year or two at least," said
D. B. Sheller, superintendent of the re-
serve system to an American repre-
sentative last Sunday, upon his return
from a ride of several weeks through
the greater portion of the vast area.
"The conditions at this time demon-
strate that those now in the range are
going to run short of sufficient forage to
sustain their flocks and herds as they
should be and keep them in condition
for the markets or a long winter on hay.
This statement I give publicly in ad-
vance of the official report, which will
reach owners much later, in order that
they may be reasonably certain of what
to expect and govern themselves
accordingly.
"In my trip I found but a few minor
derelictions on the part of the sheep or
stockmen in crowding upon prohibited
watersheds. This, no doubt, is largely
due to the fact that our rangers have
been alert and have not permitted the
herders to get within circumscribed
limits.
