Days Without Help With Had Fracture.

W. F. McNutt, an old soldier, and a man 60 years of age suffered a terrible experience in the Blue mountains from Friday morning until Sunday eyening.

Mr. McNutt went to the moun tains to get a load of wood. After getting on his load he started out Friday morning and after coming about three miles his wagon struck a stump and was turned over. The horses broke away from the wagon and ran leaving the unfortunate man under the load of wood. After a great effort he succeeded in getting out from under the wood with a badly c'erk. fractured leg and a crushed foot.

Crawling to a clump of brush he cut some sticks and taking a blanket he cut strings and bound his leg as good as possible. Taking his ax he made a pair of crutches and succeeded in going about three quarters of a mile down the road in search of help. In almost a helpless condition and with a limited food supply, suffering with great pain Mr. McNutt was compelled to endure his tortures until Sunday evening.
