**MAYFLOWER MINES.**

**Results of First Clean up Were Very Satisfactory.**

Dan Stalter came in from the Mayflower mines in the Greenhorn district, Monday having been three days on the road on horseback. Dan is a well pleased man. He has good reasons to feel well over the results of his labor. For six years he has been working the present property which he has now in shape to take out the yellow metal.

Mr. Stalter to a Gazette representative said: "Everything is now installed and I have as fine a little plant as you will find in the Greenhorn mountains."

Mr. Stalter runs his stamp mill with water power, but owing to the dry season the water is very low and the test run which was only for parts of four days is hardly a fair test of what the mill will do.

Even with the disadvantage of the short run Mr. Stalter is highly pleased. He has proven that the ore from the Mayflower group contains gold and in paying quantities. In evidence of this he brought out five bars, real gold bricks.

Along with the bars of free gold Mr. Stalter brought out a quantity of concentrates for assay. He went to Portland yesterday morning for that purpose.

As soon as Mr. Stalter comes back from Portland he will go back to the mines and will run until winter.

A number of Heppner people are interested in the Stalter mining proposition. The ore which the test has proven to be of value, is located so that it can be easily and cheaply worked. The stamp mill which is now ready for work and also a small sawmill are both run by water power and can be operated at very small expense.

Mr. Stalter is an old miner having prospected in the Greenhorn mountains for the past 25 years. About six years ago he discovered what is now known as the Mayflower group which he has been working ever since.
