## STOCK MEETING AT SUMPTER

Called by Superintendent Sheller  
to Make Grazing allot-  
ment.

Sumpter, Oregon, September 25, 1906.  
—A stock meeting will be held at  
Sumpter, Oregon, November 8, 1906,  
beginning at 10 a. m., for the purpose  
of making grazing allotments in the  
Eastern Division of the Blue Mountain  
Forest Reserve for 1907.

If you are interested, you will be ex-  
pected to be present and remain until  
allotments are made, and if not ac-  
quainted with the country you are now  
occupying, or desire to occupy, you  
should delegate some one to act for you  
under written authority, and the allot-  
ment so made you must abide by.

Certain areas have been withdrawn  
from grazing next year, and some new  
areas may be opened.

Certain driveways will be established  
upon which stock must be kept while  
crossing.

A reasonable reduction will also be  
recommended in the number of cattle  
and horses.

This notice informs you in time that  
you may make other arrangements re-  
lative to breeding, or for forage, for the  
excess number so reduced.

Because of the crowded condition of  
the range a reduction will be made in  
the number of sheep allowed for 1907,  
viz:

All permits for 1000 grown sheep or  
less may be increased 20 per cent.

All permits for from 1000 to 1200 to  
be renewed for 1200.

All permits for from 1200 to 2000 to be  
reduced 20 per cent, provided none are  
reduced below 1200.

All permits for from 2000 to 4000 to be  
reduced 30 per cent, provided that none  
are reduced below the highest number  
in the next lower grade.

All permits over 4000 to be reduced  
40 per cent under the same provision  
above.

The reductions will apply to grown  
sheep applied for in 1906, and not other-  
wise.

The Eastern Division comprises that  
part of the Reserve lying north of The  
Dalles Military Wagon Road.

## FUEL SITUATION GROWING BETTER

cut much figure. The price is  
from \$7.00 to \$7.50 per cord, in  
four foot lengths.
