Governor Chamberlain has deferred action temporarily on the petition for the pardon of John Barker, who was sent to the penitentiary from Morrow county for the killing of his niece.

Four fine Delaine bucks belonging to Wm. Straight were castrated and badly mutilated by some unknown person with malicious intent at the O. R. & N. stock-yards in this city last Sunday night. Mr. Straight had just purchased 16 head of fine bucks and had put them in the stockyards for safe keeping until he could get time to take them out to his ranch. Monday morning the mutilated animals were found. They will probably all die. The perpetrator of the brutal act will be severely dealt with if found.

A. L. Ayers came in from Parker's mill Thursday. Mr. Ayers came in to receive a big engine and boiler which was recently purchased at Milton, which will be put in right away to increase the capacity of the mill company at Parker's mill. The old mill is entirely too small to meet the growing demand for lumber, and with the new 75 horse power engine with a boiler of one hundred horse capacity will greatly increase the capacity of the plant. The engine and boiler were taken out Friday. The big boiler was loaded onto a logging wagon and it required seven mules and three horses to pull it. The engine was taken apart and was hauled with two four horse teams. The new mill will be installed and put to work as soon as possible.

Dan Stalter returned from Portland, Saturday where he had been to get an assay from the concentrates from the Mayflower mines. While the run was only a very short one and the ore was not the best on the dump, Mr. Stalter informs the Gazette that the assay was very satisfactory, showing that the concentrates will pay big dividends when sent to the smelter. Mr. Stalter's trip out this time was a flying one being made to show the stockholders the result of a short run of the stamp mill and also to get an assay of the concentrates. By the time that Mr. Stalter can get to the mines he thinks that there will be plenty of water to make the fall run with the mill. Mr. Stalter states that he would have plenty of water at all times if he had the water supply properly flumed. With the exception of about one month in the year there is an ample supply of water with the present system of fluming to furnish power for big machinery.

Mr. and Mrs. Henry Blackman who were attending the District fair at Pendleton and also the Spokane Inter-state fair returned Saturday evening. Mr. Blackman who is one of the Oregon commissioners for the Jamestown exposition naturally takes a great interest in meetings of this kind and is a competent man to judge. He was very much impressed and speaks highly of both meetings. The Pendleton fair was a great success says Mr. Blackman. The attendance was very large. The fact that Morrow county carried off 28 first prizes and several second prizes ought to be a great boost for this county. At the Inter-state fair at Spokane the exhibits were beautiful and marvelous is the opinion of Oregon's fair commissioner. There were many Dominion exhibits which attracted considerable attention. Mr. Blackman was greatly impressed with the rapid growth and the general prosperity of the city of Spokane. Mr. Blackman will leave this morning for the Hood River fair which will wind up the fairs for this season. After returning from the Hood River fair Mr. and Mrs. Blackman will immediately commence preparations to move to Portland.
