WOULD REVISE LAWS.

Superintendents and Principals Suggest Changes.

Salem, Ore., Oct. 5.—If the Legislature of 1907 shall grant any considerable portion of the recommendations of the County School Superintendents of Oregon, the public schools of the state will have more funds, longer terms and better-paid teachers. In annual session here this afternoon and evening, the superintendents and principals agreed upon many desired changes in the school laws, some of them of much importance and interest not only to teachers and officers, but to taxpayers and school patrons generally.

That the minimum length of term a district shall maintain school shall be increased from three to five months, and that the county school levy shall be raised from \$6 per capita, were the most important changes suggested. This is raising the minimum term 66 per cent, and increasing the minimum county levy 33 per cent. One recommendation of general interest to teachers is that an applicant be granted but one second or third-grade certificate in this state. At present only one such certificate may be obtained in a county, but by going from one county to another a teacher may get 33 third-grade certificates. The proposed change in the law will compel teachers to advance from year to year in their educational qualifications.

In order to raise the standard for county papers, it is advised that algebra and physical geography be added to the list of subjects upon which an applicant must be examined for a first-grade county certificate, and that mental arithmetic be dropped as a separate subject. Composition, bookkeeping and general history were suggested as proper subjects to be included in the examination for first-grade county certificates, but only the two mentioned were approved.

A motion was carried asking that the primary certificate be abolished upon the ground that it affords a means for incompetent persons to get into the schools, but upon the suggestion that the standard might be raised the question was reconsidered and left open for final action tomorrow. Superintendent Robinson of Multnomah county, asserted that the primary certificate law was enacted in order to enable one particular person to get a position in the public schools.

Superintendent Robinson strongly favored one change, which other superintendents thought no Legislature would pass a law providing, that school boards in rural districts must elect teachers from a list approved by the county superintendents. Mr. Robinson argued that this would afford a means of shutting out incompetents and protecting the teachers of his own county from the competition of teachers who drift from one county to another. Doubt was expressed whether the Legislature would place so much power in the hands of the county superintendent. No action was taken.

Roosevelt's Sharp Points.

To struggle with evils springing from our material progress, we need to increase the power of the Federal Government.

As regards many matters we must rely purely upon the states for the betterment of present condition.

If our State Legislatures would act drastically and wisely on the subject of child labor, the gain would be literally incalculable.

I base my theory of government on the words and deeds of Justice James Wilson, that there were neither vacancies nor interferences between the limits of state and National jurisdictions—that is, whenever the states cannot act, then the National Government should have complete power to act.

Only by acting in this spirit can the National Judges, legislators and executives give a satisfactory solution of the question of providing means to assert sovereignty over the immense corporations.

The narrow construction of the powers of the National Government has proved the chief means of limiting power to cut out abuses and it the chief bulwark of great moneyed interests.

The states are wholly powerless to deal with corporate wealth.

It is our clear duty to see that there is adequate supervision and control of swollen fortunes and to determine the conditions on which they shall be transmitted and the percentage they shall pay to the Government.

I maintain that the National Government should have complete power to deal with all wealth which in any way goes into the commerce between the states.

These same policies (of control over corporations,) so far from representing either anarchy or socialism, were in reality the antidotes to anarchy, the antidotes to socialism.

The Government ought not to conduct the business of the country; but it ought to regulate it so that it shall be conducted in the interest of the public.

We shall not halt; we shall steadily follow the path we have marked out, executing the laws with absolute impartiality as between man and man, and strengthen and supplement these by further laws.

We need to check the forces of greed, to insure just treatment alike of capital and of labor, and of the general public to prevent any man, rich or poor, from doing or receiving wrong, whether this wrong be one of cunning or of violence.

Hill Says Methods Must Change.

Chicago, Oct. 6.—J. J. Hill, the great railroad man, was the principal speaker at the banquet given at the Auditorium under the auspices of the Commercial association tonight. About 750 persons were present. Sir Thomas Lipton, of England, was one of the chief guests.

Mr. Hill in the course of his address stated that by the middle of the century this country will have a population of 200,000,000, and declared that the problem is to determine where these people are to find profitable employment.

Hill asserted that our public lands are practically exhausted and that even when the present plans of irrigation are completed, land will only be provided

for seven or eight million people. He believes that our iron and coal will begin to be exhausted within the next 50 years; and asserts our forests are rapidly going and that our mineral oil supply can not last.

He says we cannot continue our present methods of trade because the minerals in the ground can not recreate themselves. With the coming millions to provide for, he says our present ransacking of the government storehouse to see what can be vent over the seas must be changed to the consideration of what is. Upon the cultivation of the soil all the varied commercial activity is mainly built and upon it, he declares, depends the future of mankind.

Warden Warns the Farmers.

H. G. Van Dusen, State Fish Commissioner for Oregon, was in Gilliam county last week on official business. He is figuring on establishing a salmon hatchery on the John Day River a few miles west of Arlington.

Warden Van Dusen was asked if his business here was not to investigate the matter of farmers capturing salmon in the John Day River. He stated that farmers and citizens should be allowed to catch salmon for their own use and also should be allowed to salt down a few for Winter eating, but they should not be allowed to peddle them.

Van Dusen further stated that if caught doing this the farmers would be prosecuted in the courts for fishing out of season and east of the Deschutes, and also for peddling fish without a retailer's license. The fine on either of these charges would be from \$25 to \$500.

Van Dusen expects to return in a few days and look further into the matter of a hatchery site on the John Day River.

Davenport Has Returned.

Boston, Mass., Oct. 5.—Home Davenport, the cartoonist, formerly of Silverton, Oregon, has just arrived here from Arabia on the White Star line Canopic, via the Mediterranean. He brought 17 stations and 10 mares of blooded Arabian stock for breeding purposes.

Davenport had a personal interview with the sultan of Turkey. He was forbidden to make any pictures of the sultan, but Davenport memorized the sultan's features and made sketches. Afterward Turkish spies discovered in some way that the cartoonist had made sketches and searched his baggage, but they were disappointed for the wise artist had hidden the drawings in a bale of hay.

General News.

The Chinese ship Charterhouse foundered and went down in deep water with 60 persons on board.

The state board of barber examiners held an examination at Portland this week. Of 60 applicants 14 failed to pass.

William Abbott, aged 45, was killed in a logging camp five miles from Ashland by a heavy limb striking him on the head, crushing his skull.

Marion Freeman, a Colfax Wash. farmer, sold 16 mule colts, each 5 months old, for \$60 each and refused \$100 each for six others of the same age.

J. R. Bowles, of Portland, has sold Mack Mack, the Oregon race horse, for \$10,000, to George H. Graves and Charles H. Traiser, of Boston, at Lexington, Ky.

During the 13 days of the Interstate fair at Spokane, the total number of persons who paid admission was 112,433. The gross receipts of the association were \$70,000, and the expenses approximately \$10,000 less.

The fall and final count of fatalities in the Pocahontas, Va., coal mines disclosed 19 men dead among those in the mine when the accident occurred, and two rescuers who lost their lives since.

Lausa Adams and Henry Morgan colored, who were arrested on complaint of the Portland and Chicago police on charges of robbing Anton Fritz, an eastern tourist, of \$900 in Portland and of conspiracy to murder him in Chicago, where discharged in the district court on the ground of insufficient evidence against them.

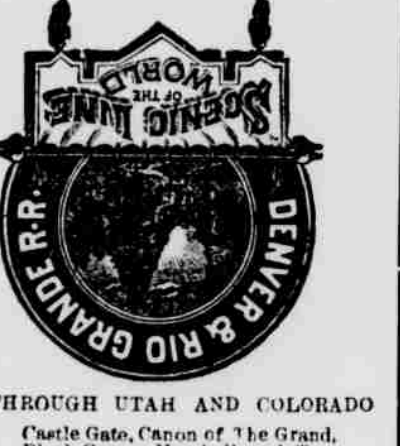

Lostine, Wallawa county, will soon hold a special election to vote on a proposition to amend the city charter so the town may, if it chooses, contract an indebtedness not to exceed \$30,000 for a water system. The town has a system owned by a private company, but it is insufficient.

Miss Ella Moore, a young woman who is taking up a homestead near Valley, Idaho, has been nominated by the republicans for the office of justice of the peace. The selection was made with the view of securing an official who could handle the office with credit.

Why Don't Homeseekers Come To Morrow County?

Morrow county produces more wealth per capita than any other county in the state of Oregon. Our territory within county lines is 75 miles in length by 35 miles in width, large enough for a state, but with not enough population for a good sized country village. Only 5000 people in the county.
