FOR BEGINNING IN IRRIGATION
Department of Agriculture Issues
Report of Practical In-
formation.

For the guidance of the great number
of people from humid regions who set-
tle on the immense areas of western
lands opened to settlement, the depart-
ment of agriculture has issued a report
on "Practical information for beginners
in irrigation."

There are several million acres open
for settlement in the United States, and
irrigation works built by private enter-
prise and works being constructed by
the national government will provide a
water supply for more than a million
acres of arid lands.

The report says there are certain to
cause an influx of settlers into Western
America during the next few years.
The report discusses arid soils and
water supplies generally and describes
how to locate and build farm ditches,
prepare land to receive water, irrigate
staple crops and how much water to
apply.

"Experience throughout the arid
region," the report says, "is demon-
strating that the greatest danger to
irrigated lands is lack of drainage.
Water applied to crops raises the
ground water, which brings with it the
salts dissolved from the soil; capillary
brings this water to the surface, where
it evaporates, and the salts accumulate
until all vegetation is destroyed. The
only insurance against this is proper
drainage, but anything—as economy in
the use of the water and thorough
cultivation—which will check the rise
of ground water or lessen evaporation,
will decrease the danger."

Fuel Famine in Spokane.
Spokane, Wash., Oct. 21.—With
chilling frosts prevailing and the winter
coming on, Spokane faces a fuel famine.
Coal is not to be had. Inquiry of all
the fuel companies discloses empty
bins and no prospect of shipments.
The supply from Roslyn has stopped
and the Wyoming mines are sending
none at present.

Wood dealers stated today that they
have on hand enough to supply the
city's fires for only one day. More is
coming by railroad, but a prolongation
of the cold snap would mean a cleaning
out of every yard. Wood retails for \$7
a cord and the price is advancing.

Pullman and all points in the Palouse
country are threatened with a fuel
famine. In fact, the famine is now
being felt in many places. There is no
coal or wood to be had in many towns,
and prices are steadily advancing.
Wood cannot be secured here, and the
last sold at \$7.50 delivered. Not a car-
load of coal has been received for
several weeks, and there seems to be
little prospect of the shortage being
relieved in the near future.

The price of coal has not advanced,
but it is impossible to get it at any
price. Dealers say they have had
orders in for three months, and have no
information when they will be filled.
The situation is growing serious, and
should a cold wave strike the country
soon, there will be suffering for want of
fuel.

Helping the State.

Some time ago, in speaking of the
tide of immigration that was steadily
flowing toward the coast, The Journal
asked: "What are the towns of Oregon
doing to attract the homeseekers?"
The question was a pertinent one, in
view of the fact that the people of Cali-
fornia were spreading the news of their
advantages, and that, despite handi-
caps, the population was steadily grow-
ing by judicious advertising. In Sep-
tember over 14,000 settlers pitched their
tents in California, and set up their
penates and lares in the smaller villages
and towns.

Oregon did not get that number,
although her fields are just as fertile,
her orchards more productive, her re-
sources as varied, her land cheaper, and
the advantages she offers to farmer
rancher, orchardist and business man
more numerous and more remunerative
than those of her sister state. Probably
we are not advertising as well as Cali-
fornia; our light, which should be shin-
ing abroad, may be hid under a bushel;
the publicity that has been given our
marvelously rich country may not have
been the right sort; there may have
been a lack of method in our advertis-
ing.—Portland Journal.

Fred Deford Arrested.

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 19.—Sheriff Am-
brose, of Canyon, Oregon, tonight
arrested Fred Deford, formerly of
Canyon City. Deford formerly ran a
butcher shop at that place. About
three months ago he disappeared, and
an investigation is said to have develop-
ed the fact that he had stolen a large
amount of beef. It is alleged that he
seems to have stolen all the meats he
handled.

Deford was recognized at the fair here
by a former acquaintance. The latter
wired the Sheriff, and the fugitive is
now in custody. Ambrose left tonight
with his prisoner. Deford consented to
go without extradition.

Sheep Shrink in Transit.

Western shippers are complaining,
and evidently not without cause, of
poor railroad service, says the Shep-
herd's Bulletin. The amendment of the
28-hour law was looking forward to as
the panacea for all transportation ills.
But the good effects of this amendment
can very easily be nullified. An Idaho
shipper recently stated at Chicago that
he got poorer transportation service this
season than for many years past.
Another expressed the opinion that
the money lost through shrinkage of
sheep and lambs coming from the west
would build a railroad and equip it for
efficient service. When trains drag
along like a wounded snake, it takes so
much time to cover any reasonable dis-
tance that the sheep have to be unload-
ed twice as often as is necessary and in
many places where there is no accom-
modation for them.

Without proper facilities for feeding
and watering at unloading points, it is
easy to understand that many members
of a big band will succumb, while the
loss from shrinkage will, in itself, be
equivalent to the loss of many sheep.

On 40 acres of ground in Jackson
county, M. L. Pellett raised pears (off
10 acres) that brought \$7,500, and his
apples will bring from \$12,000 to \$15,-
000 more—about \$500 an acre.

storms that ever swept the eastern slope
of the Rockies ranged for over 24 hours

ern Wyoming to the borders of New

plains to a depth of two feet. In the
foothills and mountains there are five or
six feet of snow.

In northern Colorado the storm was
felt severely and crop and stock losses

the near future the loss will be tre-
mendous.

hours and wires are down in all direc-
tions.
