HEAVY LAND BUSINESS.

Great Activity in Land in Lewiston District.

The wonderful activity in land in the Lewiston country is shown by the following report of the Lewiston land office from the Lewiston Tribune:

Every quarter in the history of the local land office but one has been surpassed by the receipts of the quarter which ended September 31, when the total reached \$88,422.70. The exception was the one ending December 31, 1902, the total for those three months reaching the enormous sum of \$96,808.45. It is hardly believed this latter figure will ever be exceeded. Fifty thousand dollars in land office receipts is considered a high figure. Timber and stone applications and proofs are responsible for the great showing made last quarter.

The work of checking up on the quarter was finished yesterday. The records show that during the period 164 original homestead entries were made which covered 22,761.83 acres, and the fees and commissions amounted to \$2,356.77.

The 87 final homestead proofs, the acreage amounting to 12,337.12 and the commissions to \$464.56. Seventeen commuted homestead proofs were made on 2395.63 acres of land. For these commutation proofs the office received \$4479.17 in fees and commissions.

That the scramble for timber land is responsible for the swelling of the receipts is shown when 218 timber and stone proofs were made during the quarter for a total of 30,738.98 acres. From this factor alone the government received \$75,916.16. Then there were 218 timber and stone applications that added \$2180 in commissions to the grand total.

The Northern Pacific paid into the government coffers \$342 for filing selection lists on alien land. The state's selections for the benefit of the common school system cost Idaho \$38. Two mineral entries brought \$200. The money paid into the office for the redacting of testimony, etc., into writing amounted to \$238.61, and the contest cases total \$88.34.

Four Yoncalla dryers turned out 330,000 pounds of dried prunes.

Two town lots that last winter went barging in North Bend at \$1,000 are now held at \$10,000.
