Great Yield of Alfalfa.

The Carvallis Times says of the
alfalfa crop on the state agricul-
tural college farm:

A fifth crop of alfalfa is a foot high on
the college farm. It stands thick and is
fine pasturage. The four crops that
have been taken off this season made a
yield of 27.16 tons of green feed, equi-
valent to nine tons of cured hay per
acre. This is a yield to make an Ore-
gon farmer's heart glad. Great as is
vetch, as a forage plant, it cannot
approach it.

The tract in question comprises two
acres. It was sown six years ago, and
during the five seasons that it has been
cropped, there have been 19 cuttings.

The land is ordinary wheat lands
bordering on and just a trifle above the
white land level. It is partly tile drain-
ed but not all.

It's history as an alfalfa producer has
been extremely satisfactory. It has
proven that with reasonable attention
alfalfa can be grown on almost any land
in the Willamette valley, especially if it
is well drained. This is the belief of
Dr. Withycombe who has charge of the
tract in question.

The college has six acres in alfalfa in
addition to the two-acre tract referred
to. It likewise has a thrifty yield.
The probabilities are that whenever
land is demonstrated to be an alfalfa
producer it immediately becomes worth
\$1000 or more per acre. When Benton
county produces all the alfalfa of which
it is capable, it will become a county of
rich farmers.

MONTANA SHEEPMEN.

Organize to Install Their Own
Agents in the East.

The sheepmen of Montana met in
Helena this month and formed an as-
sociation to combat the effects of East-
ern wool buyers to manipulate prices,
through which, it is alleged, the former
suffered to the extent of \$1,000,000 this
season alone. The meeting was called
by proclamation of Gov. Toole, and
after spending four days in arranging
details, a company was organized with
the election of J. E. Bowers as presi-
dent and Lewis Penwell secretary.

The company has a capital of \$500,000,
more than half of which was subscribed
by sheepmen present at the meeting.
It is proposed that Eastern warehouses
and selling agencies be installed to
handle their annual output of 40,000-
50,000 pounds without the aid of wool
brokers and jobbers. The meeting was
most enthusiastic throughout, and, in
addition to the selling company, the
stockmasters organized as a state as-
sociation. Hereafter no member of the
association will sell wool through East-
ern buyers or accept advances from
them.—Rural Spirit.
